March ExComm Meeting Minutes

February 8, 2003

Attending: John Neemidge, President; Margaret Wofford, Vice President; Geri Neemidge, Membership Chair; and Mark Kres, Member at Large.

John convened the meeting at 10:25.

John informed attendees that the hotel contract for the next RG had been received and that it was the same as the previous contract. Moved, Geri, to accept the contract as written; seconded by Margaret. Passed unanimously.

John reported that Midge Kocen, Treasurer, purchased two nine-month \$5,000 CDS rather than one six-month and one nine- or twelve-month as planned because the rate was better. She will stagger the renewals if the rate improves.

John reported that Helen has ordered colored tabs for the newsletter to improve visibility for the hardworking folding/labeling volunteers, but that she will have to pull non-bar coded labels (maybe 10 labels per month) in advance because colored tabs can foul up the USPS's bar code machinery. Helen ordered 1,000 red tabs and 1,000 black tabs which will give us a three month trial period to decide if we like colored tabs.

Geri gave a status report on upcoming programs. Attendees discussed the open Program Chair. John has asked for volunteers for the position.

John reported that he had changed the software for both the e-mail chat list and the announce list.

John adjourned the meeting at 10:45.

Hello Region 6!

Think about your newsletter Editor for a bit. What is involved in the job, what sort of person makes a good Editor, and what does an Editor need?

What's involved is relatively simple:

An Editor must be detail oriented without losing sight of the big picture; they must be able to stay within or under budget for most months in order to allow for the occasional large or enhanced issue. Editors are responsible for finding and printing items of interest to the local members and doing so in a manner that appeals to both hemispheres of the brain; they are charged with avoiding libel and unsuitable subjects; they need to be able to present a newsletter that is timely and balanced while being thoughtprovoking and occasionally humorous. The Editor must know when an absolute deadline can be slid and when it cannot. A good Editor is a diplomat, able to coax a rewrite out of an author that has submitted "the perfect piece"; and to tactfully decline submissions that are just not right for the venue. They maintain a stock of articles that may be used as needed to supplement a particular subject or when the issue is just a little short on content. The Editor knows that their newsletter is often used as an introduction to Mensa and that it is very often the only contact a member has with their local group, and knowing this strives to present the group in a manner that is both accurate and interesting.

There, I told you it was simple. Describing the sort of person that makes a good Editor is even simpler: A good Editor is a person that can (and will) do all of the above - and more, as needed.

Care and feeding of an Editor:

Your Editor needs interesting articles submitted by his readers; having a regular and dependable columnist or two in the ranks greatly eases the burden. Occasional submissions are always welcome. "Letters to the Editor" regarding previous newsletter contents demonstrate an interest in and involvement with the group -- Be Interested! Be Involved! An Editor needs to be kept current with monthly activities -- write-ups on those that have happened and notification of those pending; the newsletter calendar is a vital part of the newsletter. To that end the members need to host and attend such events as their interest and abilities allow. Sometimes to have a party you need to make a party; same thing goes for other types of gatherings. A pat on the back when deserved and offers to help out when necessary are also ways to make your Editor happier.

Next time you pick up your newsletter take the time to really *read* it and appreciate the work that goes into the production each month. Say "Thanks" and offer to help when you can. For the good of your group -- Support your Editor!
