

October Monthly Meeting

October's Monthly Meeting will be held on Tuesday, October 12, 2004, beginning at 7:00 p.m. at the North Village Library, 2139 W. Anderson Lane.

The topic will be the Libertarian Party of Texas. We have three speakers lined up for this meeting. The first is Wes Benedict, Executive Director of the Libertarian Party of Texas. The second is James Werner, current Libertarian candidate for U.S. Representative in Texas Congressional District 25. The third is Jon Roland. Founder and President of the Constitution Society.

Wes Benedict has a Masters degree in Business and Engineering from the University of Michigan. He was the Libertarian nominee for Travis County Commissioner Precinct 4 in 2002 and a candidate for Austin City Council Place 6 in 2003.

James Werner is a consultant and works in sales of information management tools for the not-for-profit sector. He has a Bachelors degree from Vanderbilt University and a Masters degree in Spanish and Latin American literature from UCLA.

Jon Roland is a computer professional with a Bachelors degree in Math from the University of Chicago. He ran for the U.S. House of Representatives in the 23rd Congressional District Democratic Primary in 1974. He was also the Libertarian nominee for Texas Attorney General in 2002.

You can expect these highly educated and thoughtful political activists to talk about their own goals and the goals of the Libertarian Party in the upcoming election and beyond. They will provide background information on the Libertarian Party and what it stands for, and they will give you their opinions on what the Libertarian party and its candidates can offer you that other parties' candidates can't or won't. I'm sure they have a lot to say on quite a few topics of interest to many members of our organization.

I'd like to see a high turnout for this last meeting before the November election. I'll see you there.

Hello Region 6!

This month let's look into Gs, specifically the AGs.

What do you like about an AG? Is it the locale, the camaraderie, the programs, or just the chance to get away from home? An AG is a tremendous affair and a tremendous undertaking by the local group that essays to host one. The amount of work and dedication required for a project of this scope is immense; is it any wonder that so few groups are willing to put in a bid? The Site Selection Committee (SSC) is responsible for obtaining and evaluating these bids and, based on the bid(s) submitted, for determining the location of upcoming AGs. Planning and groundwork is at least a two year process, although when times are tight it has been done in less. Accepting a bid from a local group should be done four years out, three at the least -- the Las Vegas bid was submitted with less time than that. Currently bids are being sought for '08 although there are as yet none submitted for '07.

What should be done if no bid is received within a reasonable time frame? Should we hire a professional firm to do the work? That would be highly expensive and have little or none of the Mensa flavor we have come to expect. Should we call on the national office to do all of the planning? It would still be necessary to hire people for the round-the-clock caretaking that is required, and again much of the flavor would be lost. Las Vegas was done by the local group in conjunction with a nation-wide net of very active volunteers; a giant step towards the consortium concept. Perhaps we should just do without and see how people like that; maybe some would be inspired to bid and ensure that such a thing never happens again.

I really don't know what we should do, I do know that the SSC cannot pull rabbits out of hats or bids out of thin air. Some members seem to think otherwise but it just ain't so. Given the dearth of bids perhaps the time has come to entertain the thought of staging an AG without the direct involvement of the local group. What do you think?


