Words Are Spoken Here

A picture may be worth a thousand words, but in some cases a sound and a few words can convey a thousand unspoken feelings. And that is the whole idea behind the listening of stories, plays and poetry instead of just reading them.

The art of story-telling is being practiced at local libraries, on public radio, at story-telling guilds and clubs, and at poetry slams in Dallas' Deep Ellum and nationally. Readings of plays goes on monthly at both the Hub Theater and at the Bath House Cultural Center. Radio dramas are recreated locally and in ever expanding national venues.

Imagine, for example, the difference between reading the line "Who knows what danger lurks in the hearts of men?" as opposed to hearing it spoken in a dramatic tone accompanied by a dark, evil laugh. The sound version is surely more potent, which is why audio drama and its close cousin, "spoken word," got started in the first place. No wonder it is called the theater of the mind.

Ever since such popular shows as "The Shadow" drew people to radios in the 1930s and '40s, audio drama -- or plays and vignettes performed vocally with no visual aspects -- have held a place in American culture. And spoken word -- or poetry that is "performed" by speaking it dramatically -- has claimed cultural turf since Socrates or even earlier when ancient hunters sat around the fire and recounted the day's hunt.

Spoken word and audio drama continue to play a part in today's culture, but not in the same way as in their heydays. During the past few decades, the overwhelming popularity of film and television has displaced these dramatic forms. How often does your family sit and read or tell stories to each other? While you may read stories to young children, has the practice continued to adulthood? Amazingly, however, an unlikely medium -- the Web -- has reinvigorated these classic art forms and is making them increasingly more popular.

Thanks to the Web, people who already love the spokenword form can easily find hundreds of free sites dedicated to the topic and can play on-demand, download or even stream files for listening. Fans can also hear audio drama streamed, or played live, from some radio stations' Web sites.

And people who may have never encountered these art forms

can discover them more easily as they browse large sites where audio drama, audio books, or spoken word is sold in increasing quantities. While it takes more effort to happen across a spoken-word performance in person, it isn't at all difficult to click on a link leading to a spoken-word category on a Web site.

A critical part of the phenomenon is peoples' ability to easily stream, or listen to spoken word on their computers, MP3 players, or ipods. Another reason for the popularity spurt is that the Web allows geographically far-flung segments of a small art community to connect and create a larger niche.

M Radio, national Mensa SIG, discusses and trades Old Time Radio shows in the public domain from the 30's -60's and also will review/read scripts and create podcasts from both original and old radio shows. Region 6 Report

The quarterly AMC meeting was held in Phoenix Arizona on Saturday, December 3rd. There are a number of issues and developments to report on as a result of that meeting...

- * A by-laws amendment passed, rescinding the language that mandated the use of paper ballots during election cycles. A special referendum will be held in the spring to determine whether or not electronic ballots will be made available during the 2007 elections.
- * Project Inkslinger may soon be reinvigorated! Does your local groups have a "Project Inkslinger" Coordinator. If any

of you are serving in this position or would be willing to work in such a capacity, please send an email to inkslinger@us.mensa.org.

- * There was a motion to create a "Mensan-helping-Mensan" fund. The idea was to create a fund that would be used to make annual dues payments for Mensans facing financial difficulties. The motion failed as the majority of the board felt that the need would be more appropriately addressed at the Local Group level. I was one of the sponsors of this motion and am very disappointed that the issues of administration of such a fund were insurmountable.
- * Congratulations to the Colorado Mensa consortium for being awarded the 2008 AG! Special thanks to Cookie Bakke for negotiating an incredible hotel contract. Expect old-fashioned hospitality, a great room rate and lots of space for programs.
- * Mind Games 07 was awarded to Western Pennsylvania Mensa, and will be held in Pittsburgh, PA.
- *There was a motion to amend ASIE 1995-080, which deals with funding the AMC members' hotel and meals during the upcoming WG in Orlando. Originally the ASIE called for funding for 3 days for some AMC members and 5 days for the elected officers. The vote amended the ASIE to fund all AMC members for 5 days. I was the mover of this motion. If you disagree with this action, please contact me on RVC6@us.mensa.org. I would be happy to discuss my reasoning.

Mini Minutes of the Meeting of the American Mensa Committee

December 3, 2005 Tempe, Arizona

Appointments: Ed Raper, Gifted Children's Outreach Coordinator; Alan Baltis, Local Group Funding Task Force Chairman; and Henry Miller, Local Group Premises Feasibility Task Force Chairman. Committee Chairs appointed were: Dr. John Sheehan, Name & Logo; Bob Beatty, Structure Review; and Dave Remine, Hearings Review.

A new volunteer position was created for a National Events Hotel Consultant to assist in hotel consulting and negotiations, if requested by a group interested in hosting a national Mensa event. This position will be effective April 1, 2006.

The bid of the Denver Consortium to host the 2008 Annual Gathering in Denver, Colorado July 2-6, 2008, was accepted, subject to the receipt of Host and Hotel Contracts acceptable to the Executive Committee.

AMC members who are not members of the Mensa International Board of Directors (IBD) will be funded for two additional days in order to attend the official IBD meeting and activities at the World Gathering in August, 2006.

For the purposes of reporting income and expenses, local groups that exceed the IRS threshold for nonprofit organizations (currently \$25,000) in annual gross revenue shall be included in the financial activity of AML, for annual reporting to the IRS. Local groups that have been granted a separate IRS filing status shall report this activity to the IRS as required and also provide a copy of the IRS form to the Mensa national office. In the event of a local group hosting a national event (Annual Gathering, Colloquium, or other activity), it shall be included in the financial activity of AML or the Mensa Education and Research Foundation.

Policy for internet communications was amended to remove the ban on electronic versions of member directories for Local Groups, provided these are only available for download via the secure web site under the auspices of Internet Services.

The AMC will hold an annual planning session each year in Arlington, Texas, at the fall AMC meeting, beginning in 2007.

Proposed amendments to the Bylaws of American Mensa, Ltd. that will enable electronic voting will be submitted to a special referendum of the members.

The next meeting of the AMC will be March 24-26, 2006, in Greenville, South Carolina.
