Annual Financial Review Report

February 3, 2007

Lone Star Mensa

For the period January 1, 2006 to December 31, 2006

Prepared by Mark Kres, Member in Good Standing; Lonestar Mensa

Member in Good Standing, Texas Society of Certified Public Accountants

The financial records for the above-cited time were reviewed with the current Treasurer. The review was not an audit conducted in accordance with Generally Accepted Auditing Standards, and was limited in scope.

Findings:

- 1. When the treasurer took office, he performed his own review of the books. As a result, the 2006 opening balance of the chapter's net worth (assets minus liabilities) was adjusted downward by \$434.35. This brought the books into line with actual cash balances and put the financial statements on an accrual basis. Previously, the books had been kept on a mixture of accrual basis (revenues and expenses recognized when they are incurred) and cash basis (revenues and expenses recognized only when cash is received or paid).
- 2. Policies and procedures in effect for the chapter treasurer were reviewed. The transactions reviewed were in compliance with the policies and procedures.
- 3. A sample of income transactions was reviewed to source documentation and all samples were found to be correct.
- 4. A sample of expense transactions was reviewed to source documentation and all samples were found to be correct.
- 5. All bills examined were being paid on a timely basis.
- 6. A sample of checks was reviewed to verify that all the checks examined were signed by someone other than the payee. This procedure has been followed.
- 7. All deposits of the Local Group Support funding from AMC which were examined were received on a timely basis.
- 8. The current Treasurer has implemented double-entry bookkeeping practices. They are supported by Microsoft Excel software. This has enabled him to provide

more detailed and accurate information on a timely basis to the membership.

Conclusions:

- 1. Preliminary financial statements indicate that the group operated at a net profit for the period examined.
- 2. All source-level documentation is kept in an orderly fashion and appears to be complete.

Recommendation:

That the current bookkeeping practices should continue to be used.

March Monthly Meeting

Topic: Creativity

Presenter: Claude Van Lingen

Claude van Lingen, an artist and art instructor with extensive experience teaching art and creativity, will discuss creativity in the artistic process.

Claude studied at the Johannesburg College of Art, South Africa from 1949-1952. Instruction, by teachers who were graduates of the Royal College of Art, London, England was based on the strict academic British art school system of the time.

In 1961 Claude studied under Henri Goetz at the Acadamie Notre Dames des Champs, Paris, France. In 1965 he was appointed chairman of the Teacher Training Department at the Johannesburg College of Art, and in 1970 was appointed chairman of the Fine Art Department of the same school.

In 1970, realizing the lack of creative thinking course in an otherwise thoroughly satisfactory curriculum, he designed a course to address the problem. The results of this course were so successful that he applied the same type to thinking to his own work. This move resulted in his winning the Earnest Oppenheimer Memorial Trust Award at the 1973 Art South Africa Today Exhibition – judged by a curator from the Tate Gallery of London – and showing at the Sao Paulo Biennial in 1975. From 1982 to 1985 he taught the course in creative thinking at the School of Visual Arts in New

York. A number of his former students are exhibiting on the international circuit and are teaching in prestigious schools in the United States, Canada, Europe, and South Africa.

In 1978 Claude left South Africa and settled in New York where he regularly participated in group exhibitions, notably being invited to show at the prestigious John Weber Gallery in 1991. He exhibited in a number of anti-apartheid exhibitions during the 1980s and was represented by the Vera Engelhorn Gallery in New York during the 1990s. Since 1980 various incarnations of his 1000 Years From Now theme have been shown in galleries in the US and Canada, and in the Johannesburg Art Museum. His work is in the collections of museums throughout South Africa and in the Musee des Art Decoratiefs de la Ville de Lausanne, Switzerland.

Lonestar Mensa Programs Opportunities for Participation

Note: This is the first in a series of articles describing the Lonestar Mensa program structure and associated officer positions.

In the past few years, most of the activities of Lonestar Mensa seem to have been led by a few dedicated people with the rest of us standing by watching. In my case, family, school, and other activities had not left me much time to devote to LSM. I sometimes attended the TGIT and helped fold the newsletters and occasionally attended a Monthly meeting, RG, or social function, but I hesitated to participate more because most activity leader positions required a significantly larger time commitment. I eventually joined the Executive Committee as a Member-at-Large only because it had a small commitment of one night a month. I volunteered for Treasurer because no one else came forwarded to do the work. The Treasurer's job required more time commitment, but the work was flexible and could be done between other commitments I have in my life. I simply did not have time for a larger commitment to LSM. In discussing my situation with other members I found that my situation was common. Some members said they would like to participate more but the positions all required more commitment that they were willing to assume.

Last year, the 2006 Executive Committee discussed the problem of finding volunteers and it seemed to us that if we had more positions with less commitment for each, there would be more opportunities for members who wanted to participate but did not have the time for greater commitment. We decided that the best way to do this was to divide up the work of our current activities into smaller packages so that those who had a lot going on in their life could participate. But, to accommodate those who wanted to do more, we thought that it would also be important to have some opportunities with greater responsibilities and more time commitment. So, as one of their first actions, the 2007 Executive Committee members approved ASIE (action still in effect) 2007-1-1 defining roles for 41 coordinators and committee chairs arranged in a hierarchical program structure under the LocSec (president) and Executive Committee. These positions provide a mixture of small commitments and larger commitments so that members may participate according to the time they have available. In addition, the ASIE specified that members could hold more than one position if they desired. A copy of the description part of the ASIE was printed on page 7 of the January 2007 Armadillo while the full ASIE is available on LSM Website.

In the next few months, I plan to describe the overall program structure and then address each program, together with its positions. I hope you will find this series of interest.
