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### **Histerical Meanderings**

Anyone familiar with horse racing knows the terms "win", "place" and "show". For the benefit of those who do not, these refer to the horse that wins the race, the one that comes in second and the one who comes in third. Mostly this is important to people who are betting on the race. It also has significance for national politics in the United States. Everyone knows who the President and the Vice President are (and if they don't, they shouldn't be voting in an election!) Relatively few people know who is in the "show" position. In the past few years that may have increased somewhat with the fact that, for the first time in history, a woman has been Speaker of the House of Representatives. But only a few years ago the Capital Steps, a political satire singing group based in Washington, D.C. had a song that satirized the fact that few Americans knew who Dennis Hastert was and the fact that he was "third in line for the throne" because of his position as Speaker.

How serious is consideration of the Number Three position? Only once in history has this been a really serious consideration. That was when Vice President Spiro Agnew was forced to resign for criminal activity, leaving the U.S. with no VP. When the clouds gathered around President Richard Nixon, he must have guessed that the result would be his own resignation. He had to appoint someone to the VP position so there would be an orderly succession. Nixon appointed Gerald Ford, the House Minority Leader as the new VP. A year later Ford became President upon the resignation of Nixon. Had Nixon not made an appointment, due to the vacancy the succession would have passed on to Carl Albert, then Speaker of the House. The Speaker is elected within the House to the position, but represents the popular vote of only one Congressional district. Gerald Ford is remembered as the President who never won a national election to office (including his own attempt at a second term!)

Back to the "place horse". Along with this basic ignorance of our own governmental system, people should pay more attention to who the vice presidential nominee is for the party they wish to vote for. This includes the party candidate for President! Often the VP person is selected to "balance the ticket", meaning someone who will appeal to a different demographic than the Presi-

dential candidate to sweep a wider net to collect more votes. Often little thought is given to their capabilities as the person who is "a heartbeat away from the Presidency." Can you imagine the U.S. Government run by Dan Quayle? How about Dick Cheney? One might argue that some presidents have been protected from assassination by consideration of who would replace them if they died!

So, when you vote, consider not only your party choice or candidate choice, whichever you use to determine your vote, but also consider, at least a little, who is in that "heart beat from the Presidency" position. What would happen if the President were to die or be incapacitated and the VP had to step up? Is this the person you could expect to continue with the policies and programs you were expecting when you voted? Do they have the strength and leadership ability to do the job? Do they represent sound judgment on the part of the presidential candidate for that position?!!! Maybe that is something to consider when you step into the voting booth.

The Bylaws Committee met for the seventh time 7:15-8:20 PM, July 10, with TGIT at Central Market. We approved last month's minutes and other prior work, discussed questions and answers from the Bylaws Workshop at the 2008 Annual Gathering, continued work on the ideas and questions that we need to answer. More specifically the committee approved officer titles of LocSec, Vice-President, and standing committee chair titles—Communications Chair, Education Chair, Recruitment Chair, and Symposia Chair; Coordinator. It also approved the four standing committee titles with the same names (Communications Committee, etc.). At our next meeting we plan to take up election methods and what officers we want to identify in the Bylaws and ASIEs. Come to the Bylaws Committee meeting and stay for the rest of TGIT. Our next meeting is 6-7 PM, Thursday, August 7, and TGIT will meet 6-8 PM. Bylaws Committee meetings are open and all may attend.

### **RVC 6 Report**

July 7th

The Annual Gathering (AG) broke our attendance records, with over 2000 members. It appeared to run very smoothly with few cancelled programs or glitches. TV cameras abounded as "60 Minutes" or some similar program taped us in action. We hope it turns out to be good publicity.

The Annual Business Meeting (ABM) produced few surprises. A motion by Jared Levine to restructure the National Hearings Committee passed after a few revisions and will be put to a referendum next year. The Hearings Review Committee will be putting forth their own motion(s) this fall.

Items of note at the American Mensa Committee (AMC) meeting include:

- 1. The initial report by Tecker Consulting (quite a few hours) identified AMC's major problems as being too bogged down by Administrivia (such as debating minutes for a half an hour), being primarily reactive rather than proactive, having a less-than-ideal amount of teamwork, and having no coherent long term strategy. They appear to being doing a comprehensive analysis. AMC will attempt to develop a cohesive long term strategy accordingly.
- 2. AMC voted to increase our dues to \$59 starting next year due to rapidly increasing costs in all operations. Members can avoid some of these increases by opting for one of our multi-year dues plans before December 31st.
- 3.AMC accepted the National Hearings Committees' recommendations and expelled Barry Levine from AML membership.
- 4. Permian Basin Mensa was awarded the "Innovative Owl Award" in recognition of "outstanding membership retention". Great job, folks!
- 5. Central Oklahoma's editor Nancy Park's newsletter Mensokie won PRP Awards in five categories (!): Overall presentation, Overall entertainment, Outstanding Newsletter, Calendar, and Owl (overall excellence). It truly has been an outstanding newsletter and Nancy is to be congratulated for her superb efforts.

- 6. Gulf Coast Mensa's Lorraine Crews won a website award for best calendar.
- 7. Central Oklahoma's TJ Lundeen won a PRP award for "humor" for her story "A Fish Tail".
- 8. I had the chance to meet some of our Regions Editors & LocSecs both in Hospitality and my "Meet your RVC Session". I also had the chance to meet some real asshole Gen-Xers at my session. It made me appreciate nice Gen-Xers all the more.



### **Scholarship Award Essay**

The essay below won a scholarship at the National level, officially a Grosswirth-Salny scholarship! This essay is by Sarah Kline from Plano. The essay speaks for itself. I apologize in advance for any typographical errors I may make and miss, and I also apologize for the error I made in the previous essay last month, leaving out a zero in 40, thus having the essay start with a midlife crisis at age 4.

#### Winning Scholarship Essay by Sarah Kline

In December 1993, my family adopted a female beagle named Lucky. She sparked not only my love for animals, but also my interest in their well-being. Ever since, I have aspired to become a veterinarian and open my own veterinary clinic.

At the beginning of the summer of 2000, I applied for a job at a veterinary clinic. I began working for Dr. Shawn Messonnier, DVM, a holistic, exotic, and smallanimal veterinarian. I started as a volunteer, since I was only 15, and was offered a part-time position for the following summer. With Dr. Messonnier, I learned how to assist in surgery and appointments, run lab work, manage the front office, and work in the kennel. Also, he taught me about treating diseases and problems with a homeopathic approach (treating the animal as a whole - not just the current problem) and how to use holistic and complementary medicine together. After 4 years of experience at his clinic, I decided to work for a different veterinarian to experience work at another clinic. The summer after my freshman year of college, I worked full-time for Dr. Tiffany Shurtz, DVM. Through Dr. Shurtz and Dr. Scott Grant, DVM,

the veterinarian I currently work for, I have seen the more traditional approach to veterinary medicine and have strengthened my technician abilities. After almost 8 years of technician experience, I fully understand how a vet clinic really works and the time and energy required to build a successful business.

This past fall, I applied for admission at Texas A&M's College of Veterinary Medicine, and I will find out mid-March if I have been accepted [she was accepted]. I received an interview in December, and I feel confident that it went well. Having already attained my Bachelor's of Science degree in biomedical science in 3 years, I am currently enrolled in a non-thesis Master's in Veterinary Science degree program at Texas A&M University, with a concentration in physiology. If I am accepted to veterinary school, I will finish my masters this summer and begin veterinary school in the fall. If I am not accepted, I will finish my degree in the fall/spring.

While my primary goal is entering veterinary school and attaining my DVM, I also have thought past vet school graduation. Last summer, Dr. Grant offered me a partnership at his veterinary clinic when I graduate from veterinary school. He expressed interest in my taking over the surgical aspect of the clinic and incorporating my knowledge of alternative medicine into his practice. Also, I want to work not only with small animals, but also with exotics. I am eager to take electives in veterinary school that will allow me to confidently treat exotic animals. Another goal of mine is to work with the Houston SPCA as a veterinarian. My passion is helping animals, including ones that have no owner looking out for them. I hope to dedicate volunteer and on-call time each month to treating these animals and sending them on the road to a new life.

Since the age of 7, I have planned and prepared for a career as a veterinarian.

I know that veterinary medicine is in my future. Who would have guessed that adding a dog to our family would have inspired my career choice?



### **July ExComm Meeting Minutes**

The regular monthly meeting of the Lonestar Mensa Executive Committee (ExComm) convened on July 9, 2008, at 6:05 PM, at Northwest Community Center, 2913 Northland Dr., Austin, TX. Attending were: President Ron Edelstein as Chairman, Vice-President Don Drumtra as Secretary, Treasurer Patty Drumtra, Member at Large Janet Kres, and Newsletter Circulation Manager and Lapsed Member Coordinator Helen Siders. The ExComm approved without debate the June 10 ExComm minutes as published in the July Armadillo Literary Gazette (ALG), page 8.

Ron reported that he reviewed the original checking account statement comparing all checks written against the supporting documentation in the Treasurer's books, that there were no discrepancies, and that the documentation fully supported the expenditures. He reviewed a printout of the June account statements for CD 1 and 2 and determined that the interest was properly posted to the CDs.

Don reported the main topics discussed at the Local Secretary's Workshop at the Annual Gathering. The topics included the LocSec email list, merging chapters, video taping meetings, local group leader title, and records management. Of particular interest was a topic discussing chapters who have large amounts of accumulated funds and whether those funds should be saved or spent. The American Mensa Committee (AMC) has chartered an ad-hoc committee to look at how local groups use the resources they have been given.

Patty reported the revenue and expenses for June and the first half of 2008 and the account balances as of June 30. LSM is financially sound but that expenditures continued to be below expected levels. The ExComm adopted without debate the second quarter financial report for publication in the ALG. Financial reports are available to members by request.

Janet reported for the Recruitment Committee that the new member party was a success and that Texas testing sessions have been scheduled for Round Rock on July 12, for Austin at 9 AM on August 30 at the LonestaRG, for Austin on a September date to be determined, and for Round Rock on October 18. Helen reported that she mailed reminders to all lapsed members using labels from the National Office.

### Treasurer's Report Second Quarter 2008

With the end of the first half of the year, Lonestar Mensa was in sound financial condition. As may be seen from the top of the of the Cumulative Program Activity table, we should have accumulated 50 percent of our expected revenue and spent 50 percent of our budget. We are close on the revenue side at 49 percent. However, we have spent only 30 percent of our budget. This leaves room for more activities in the second half of the year. Looking at the Balance Sheet table, one can see \$1845 in the escrow account. This is mostly the 46 registrations for the RG that we hold until the RG actually happens. The Balance Sheet also shows that most of our money is in CDs, providing revenue for education and scholarship funding. Unfortunately, the

interest rate is currently less than 3 percent. We hope to use some money from the RG raffles to help in this area. The Lonestar Executive Committee approved this report on July 9, 2008.

### **Engineer's Corner**

Spectacular Software Failures Office Max sells a copy of Windows XP Pro for \$299.99 and a copy of MS Office Pro for \$449.99. Does that seem like a lot of money? At least these programs will work after you install them. What if you paid that much and the programs couldn't be used? Welcome to the world of large software projects. Windows XP has about 40 million lines of code. Some large software projects, like those used at the IRS, have hundreds of millions of lines and cost hundreds of millions of dollars to develop. Somewhere on the order of 20% of these monster software programs will fail and be abandoned before, during, or after they are deployed. Some examples:

Ford Motor's purchasing system was abandoned after deployment costing \$400 million. McDonald's information purchasing system was canceled after \$170 million was spent. Kmart's supply chain management system was canceled after \$130 million had been spent. The IRS canceled its' tax modernization effort after \$4 billion was spent. The state of Washington canceled a DMV software system after \$40 million was spent. The United Way's administrative processing system was canceled after \$12 million was spent. Washington DC abandoned a new city payroll system after deployment costing \$25 million. Fox Meyer Drug went bankrupt after abandoning their \$40 million ERP system after deployment. The FAA canceled its' advanced automation system after spending \$2.6 billion. The state of California canceled a new DMV system after spending \$44 million. Allstate Insurance abandoned an office automation system after deployment costing \$130 million. The FBI's virtual case file system was abandoned after deployment costing \$170 million.

Why do such large multi-million dollar software projects fail so frequently? There are many factors. Poor communication between the software engineers and the client, unrealistic project goals, engineers taking on projects that are too complex for their firms, trying to implement an immature technology, and poor project management are among the most prominent. These are well known established reasons that have been well documented. So, why do they continue to occur? It's similar to auto accidents—we know why they happen and how to prevent them (drinking, driving too fast, inexperienced drivers). Still, we continue to shun the practices that could avoid them.

It seems that as long as people will be people, we will have to live with millions of dollars of wasted effort on buggy, useless, poorly written software. Getting quality software projects completed on time, within budget, and within design parameters just doesn't seem to be a priority with many companies and governments. Despite the fact that many of these software projects are of vital importance to a company's future, management often fails to understand what's at stake and see to it that proper resources are assigned to these projects to prevent them from failing.
