Don's Dialectics

Have you heard the phrase, "it's too complex"? How about something like, "The Federal Communications Commission National Broadband Plan is 360 pages long. That is much more complex than it needs to be. We need a simple plan to tell us where we need to go to provide digital access to all Americans." Or, "The Health and Human Service definition of electronic records is 556 pages. It's much more complex to than it needs to be. What we need is a simple definition of an electronic record that everyone can understand." Or, "The health care bill is over 1000 pages long. No one can comprehend such a bill. We need to start over and write a bill that is short, simple, and easy for everyone to understand." Each of these fictitious examples get at the idea of something being too complex. Many of us have a yearning to return to the simple life and simple decisions, where everyone agrees on a simple plan and implements it in harmony. We want simple rules of thumb. And we want simple answers to our problems. Unfortunately life is not like that. Can you fix your own car? Do you even know how the anti-lock brakes work? Try to fix your own car. Look inside your TV, what does each of the integrated circuits do? Take a look at the list of software drivers in your computer, can you explain why each of those drivers are necessary? Do you really believe there is a simple fix for the Toyota acceleration problem?

This whole idea of complexity was driven home to me after looking at some photos of the class of submarines Ron Edelstein used to serve on. (See http://www.nonplused.org/panos/uss pampanito/) While in the Navy, Ron earned the Dolphin badge which he proudly wore on his uniform. The badge testified that he had embraced the complexity of this submarine and understood every part of it. He writes, "In order to earn your dolphins, you had to learn how to operate, repair, jury rig, bypass and substitute for every piece of equipment you see in those pictures, and a lot more not shown. You had to be able to do it in total darkness, coming awake from full sleep. Dolphins do not come easy!" I was inspired by Ron's comments and went back and looked at the FCC plan, looked at the definition of electronic records, and skimmed the health care plan. They are long but really not all that complex, certainly much less complex than Ron's submarines.

We live in a complex world and explanations need to

be complex if we want to understand how things work. Although there are many things in life that are too complex to understand, man made things are usually not among them. We can (in particular, we Mensans can) understand most things if we want to. Is this understanding something that we as Mensans could share with our friends, neighbors, and community? Should we read these complex documents and explain to others what they really are about? Should we help them understand that complexity is here to stay? Perhaps we should help them understand that complexity is an important attribute of life, not something be feared, shunned, or simplified, but something that we all should embrace and master not just for our own benefit, but for the benefit of society.

Solar Panels

A Green Alternative for Power Generation

You have read about solar panels in ads, seen them on buildings, and noticed then on some calculators. But what are they? How do they work? Can they really save you money? On Wednesday, May 12, Leslie Libby is scheduled to present a stimulating lecture on solar panels in general and the Austin Solar for School and Solar Rebate Programs in particular. And she can answer your questions because she is Austin's manager for these programs. But what are they?

Through Solar for Schools over 30 schools served by Austin Energy have solar demonstration projects. In partnership with the US Department of Energy and Austin Energy, Austin Independent School District developed and is using a solar curriculum in the classroom. This curriculum uses solar energy as the vehicle for teaching core science and math competencies.

Since the Solar Rebate Program's inception in 2004, over 1000 participants have installed photo voltaic systems at their homes or businesses. Austin Energy has given rebates for or installed a total of 4 MegaWatts of photovoltaic power.

Leslie's presentation will be the third in our series on Climate Protection in Austin. During our March Program, Sascha Peterson, the City of Austin Climate Protection Coordinator, provided an excellent overview of the City's plan to reverse our impact on climate change. During our April program Larry Alford, of Austin Energy's Emerging Transportation Technologies program presented details on Austin's electric vehicle program called the Plug-in-Partners Program. And in June we are working for a presentation on reducing our home's carbon footprint.

On May 12, we are fortunate to have been able to schedule Leslie Libby's solar panel program. We hope to see many of our fellow Mensans at 7 PM at the North Village Branch Library on the SW corner of Steck at Burnet.in Austin. See the What's Happening page for details. Y'all come.

From the RVC

I have been taken to task by The Joyce Lundeen of Central Oklahoma Mensa over my last RVC column. T.J. asks how I can expect potential candidates for national office to get interested in national Mensa issues if their RVC won't discuss them publicly. Well, the fact is that what discussion I see on national Mensa issues in places like M-Pol is mostly being carried on by ill-informed ideologues who would make very poor national officers even if they had a snowball's chance of being elected. This does not make me think that public discussion of national issues on a regional level would be particularly valuable. I repeat, however, that if any of you have any fact-based concerns about anything in American Mensa, whether it's something the American Mensa Committee is currently discussing or not, I would be happy to hear from you.

If you stop to think of American Mensa as what it is, a multi-million-dollar business corporation, you will understand when I say that the candidates we need for national office are not those especially interested in national Mensa issues, but rather experienced business people. I don't particularly want Mensa to be led by single-issue hotheads who burn with a desire to show the rest of us *How the Cow Ate the Cabbage*, and I don't think that's what most of you want, either.

Now, if I run across an issue that doesn't have pretty obvious right and wrong sides, strictly from a business standpoint, you can be assured that I will ask for the opinions of the membership, but you would probably be surprised at how few such issues there are. In fact, during my first year in office, there have been exactly none.

I'll be at the Houston RG over Memorial Day weekend, at the AG in Dearborn from June 30th through July 5th, and at the Austin RG for Labor Day weekend, so any of you who disagree can corner me and beat me up about this at any of those places, or just e-mail me at rvc6@ us.mensa.org. With the exception of T.J., no one else has contacted with me about the April column, so unless I hear from you to the contrary, I'm going to have to assume that most of you are happy with the status quo.

During the coming year, in addition to the region's three RGs, I'm going to try to visit at least another 4 or 5 of the smaller local groups, so if you would like me

to drop in on one of your events, let me know (a month or so in advance, if possible). I've already been to Fort Worth, Austin, San Antonio, Oklahoma City, and Little Rock, and I'll be in Houston later this month, so the candidates for the remainder of the year are East Texas, Northern Louisiana, Baton Rouge, New Orleans, Eastern Oklahoma, Lubbock, Permian Basin, Paso del Norte, and New Mexico.
