December Board Minutes

The regular monthly meeting of the Lonestar Mensa Board of Officers convened at 6:02 PM, December 7, 2010, at Ron Edelstein's home, 1439 Dapplegrey Lane, Austin, TX 78727. Attending were: **Ron Edelstein, Don Drumtra, Patty Drumtra, Linda Edelstein, and John Neemidge**. The Board adopted without debate the agenda and the November minutes printed in the November *Armadillo Literary Gazette (ALG)* page 3.

Linda presented the November 2010 Financial Report. She said we are in good shape, as usual, and we could consider spending more by increasing the number of pages in the the newsletter. The Board approved the Financial Report with debate.

Reporting by email for the Education Committee, Claudia Harbert, Scholarship Chairman, announced that the 2011 Scholarship Judging Day will be January 29.

Don reported for the Symposium Committee that Mike Poole, New Member Coordinator, checked out a venue for a possible new, younger, group event and reported that it was not useful and that Helen Siders was planning the spring picnic and was looking at possible Saturdays in March and April. Ron and Linda reported that they have completed arrangements for the Christmas Party on Saturday, December 18 and plan to send out an announcement extending the deadline for reservations to attend.

Don moved that the Annual Member Business Meeting required by the bylaws be added to the 2011 calendar as the January membership meeting. His suggested a presentation of Mensa plans for the future and discussion of Lonestar Mensa members' participation and goals for 2011 and 2012. The board adopted the calendar change with debate (ASIE 2010-30).

Don moved to thank the Mind Games Bid Special Committee and particularly its Chairman, Patsy Graham, for their work in preparing and submitting our unsuccessful bid to host Mensa Mind Games 2012 and to dismiss the committee. The motion passed without debate.

Don moved to reconsider the date of the July 2011 board meeting because of its potential conflict with board member attendance at the Annual Gathering and the Alaska cruise. The board decided that any revision of dates after March

would be best left to the 2010-2011 board. The motion was defeated.

The next monthly board meeting will be 6 PM, Tuesday, January 4, at the Edelstein's home.

The meeting adjourned at 7:01 PM.

LIES

I'm so tired of being lied to! It sometimes seems to me our whole society is built on lies.

And the lying starts early. We tell our children the policeman is their friend, even though we know that there's only a fine line between the police and criminals. (Just look at the way police are portrayed on most TV shows—how they lie, play tricks, intimidate, break laws, make deals, etc. on shows like **Law and Order**.)

We tell our teenagers they are bad if they don't abstain from sex, when we know the drive is more powerful during adolescence than at any other time, and we know that we didn't. We tell them marijuana is more dangerous than alcohol or tobacco, when we know that the opposite is true. We tell them that if they finish school and work hard, they'll be successful, when we know that what it takes to get to the top in business or politics is connections and lack of a conscience.

We talk about how obesity is a major problem in this country, and spend billions of dollars on weight loss schemes, all the while building more fast-food restaurants and developing ever-more-complicated, larger-sized snacks, desserts, and beverages.

And then there's the marketing/advertising industry. Their sole function is to figure out how to make us want things we don't need (and that may even be harmful to us in the long or short term) by lying to us. They study our psychology, they figure out our hot buttons, they overwhelm our defenses. They won't stop until every conceivable surface on and above the planet is covered with ads. Just in the last few years we've been forced to endure:

- · Commercials played on screens above urinals.
- $\cdot \quad \text{Commercials packaged with school programs.} \\$
- · Spam and pop-up ads on our PCs
- Telemarketers on our cell phones and other hand-held devices*.
- 30% of every TV and radio program reserved for ads.
- 50% and more of every newspaper and magazine devoted to ads*.
- Commercials being run before the show in movie theaters.
- · Big buildings, and sporting and entertainment events renamed for sponsors.

I've read that the Bush administration wanted to sell all the

exhibits in the Smithsonian to the highest bidder. So each item would have borne a plaque with the name of its sponsor.

Double-speak has far outdistanced anything predicted in books like **1984** and **Brave New World**. Corporations don't fire workers who've built up their pay and benefits and bullshit-detectors too high so they can replace them with workers without these attributes. Oh no, they "down-size," or "out-source," or "off-shore." People are urged to "check with their doctors" about medications without even saying what they're for. They try to convince us it's normal to pop a pill for every conceivable "condition," even though the list of possible adverse reactions is worse than what the pill supposedly treats.

Politicians promise whatever they think the voters want to hear, and then after they get into office go ahead and do whatever they want, and no one holds them responsible. The corporate-controlled media routinely feed us mega-doses of pabulum (a la' the Kardashians, celebrity gossip, etc.), rather than meaty issues—and then they tell us they've done "studies" to show that's what we really want. (Is that what you want? I don't think so.)

I'd like to yell out my window "I'm mad as hell, and I'm not going to take it any more!" But who would listen? Isn't there any way to make this stop?



From the RVC

It's hard to believe that 2010 is already over, and it's time to wish all of you a very happy New Year. I'm still recuperating from a very busy month in November, starting with the fall meeting of the American Mensa Committee in Fort Worth and finishing with North Texas Mensa's Regional Gathering, the annual Feast of Pleasures and Delights, over Thanksgiving weekend. The RG was enjoyable from beginning to end; I wish I could say the same for the AMC meeting. I'm already looking forward to Gulf Coast Mensa's RG in May.

Actually, the meeting in Fort Worth was very productive, with a lot of hard work being done by the AMC, your national Board of Directors. We discussed the report of the Governance Task Force that I talked about in last month's column, and began the long process of considering changes to our basic organizational structure based on the Task Force's findings. I'll go into more detail about that as specific proposals begin to emerge from our discussions.

I was disappointed, however, that the AMC decided, over my objection, to raise dues next year by \$4. This amount is what we projected to be necessary to carry us through 2013 without another increase, but I felt (and still feel) that an increase of this magnitude is unwise under present economic conditions. I did receive a commitment from at least one member of the finance committee to reconsider this increase if membership growth produces sufficient new revenue to make a lesser dues amount workable. Should you see fit to re-elect me this spring, I will be seeking appointment to the finance committee myself when the AMC is reorganized for the 2011-13 term.

Likewise, my proposal to restructure the process for disciplinary hearings failed to attract sufficient support, but it did succeed in getting the AMC members thinking about changes to the National Hearings Committee set-up, and I will be revisiting this subject in the coming months.

Speaking of changes, many groups recently went through local elections and have new officers taking over this month. My congratulations (or condolences) and best wishes to all of you who are newly elected to a leadership position in your local group. Please do not hesitate to contact me (rvc6@us.mensa.org) if I can be of assistance in any way.
