The regular monthly meeting of the Lone Star Mensa Board of Officers convened at 6:05 PM, March 1, 2011, at Ron Edelstein's home, 1439 Dapplegrey Lane, Austin, TX 78727. Attending were: Don Drumtra, Patty Drumtra, Linda Edelstein, Ron Edelstein, Helen Siders, John Neemidge, and Rose Berkowitz. Referenced reports and ASIEs are available on the LSM Website. Paper copies are available on request. The Board adopted without debate the 90-minute agenda and the February minutes printed in the March 2011 Armadillo Literary Gazette (ALG), page 2.

Linda presented the cumulative Financial Report, April 1-February 28, 2011 and Income and Balance Sheet for February 28, 2011. The proposed budget for 2011-2012 will be submitted by email. The Board adopted the Financial Report without debate.

Linda thanked Rose for a great job as the new editor of the ALG newsletter and for being part of the Communications Committee. We all echoed her gratitude.

Patty reported for Fred, Membership Committee Chair, that one person was tested in February and eleven potential Mensa members have registered for tests over the next two months. New member handouts were discussed.

The amount of scholarship the Education Committee awards was discussed.

Don reported for the Symposium Committee that the next scheduled speaker for the March 9 Member Meeting will talk about transportation in counties surrounding Austin. The meeting will be at the Northwest Village Branch Library.

John, LonestaRG, Co-Chair, announced the next Regional Gathering (RG) committee meeting will take place Saturday, April 23, 2011.

Rose suggested selecting a Mensa Sister City through Mensa WorldConnect. The board members had no objections.

Patty invited everyone to meet the new Mensa members 2-4 PM Saturday, March 12.

Helen announced the picnic scheduled April 2.

The regular Board meeting was recessed at 6:50 for a meeting of the Committee of the Whole to discuss concerns in the Berkowitz report and possible actions that officers could take to resolve them. . Acting as a Committee of the Whole, current and elected board members submitted to the board their

recommended Actions Plans and Actors to resolve the members concerns identified in the Berkowitz report of LSM Member Concerns, Suggestions and Action Plans. The board accepted the original report and adopted the recommended Board Action Plans and Actors without debate, ASIEs 2011-3, 2011-4.

Don moved: that a Website Working Group be established as Special Committee to implement the Board Action Plans in the LSM Website section of the Berkowitz Report; that the committee consist of Rose Berkowitz and Patsy Graham (subject to Patsy's acceptance) as Co-Chairs, and the members specified in the Plan; and that the Board Action Plans be amended to show the special committee, ASIEs 2011-5 and 2011-6.

Don announced that he will be posting a frequently updated progress report on the LSM web site to track resolution of the member concerns, ASIE 2011-7.

The next monthly board meeting is scheduled for 6-7 PM, Tuesday, April 5 at Central Market North. Note: This is a change from our usual meeting place.

The meeting adjourned at 7:15 PM.

Highlights of beginning include the board establishing a special committee to address Website problems. The committee has not yet met, but web pages are slowly being updated. As I mentioned last month, the national Mensa elections are just around the corner, and in the next few weeks you may encounter all kinds of solicitations urging you to vote for one candidate or another. Now, obviously I hope you'll choose to reelect me as your Regional Vice Chairman, but that's not really what I want to talk about this month. No, what concerns me is that in Mensa, unlike many other organizations, anyone can put themselves forward as a candidate for any office, whether they have the slightest hint of qualification for that office or not. Mensa, after all, is a three-million-dollar-ayear business, and it just might be important that the running of that business be in the hands of people who know what they are doing.

Too often, though, Mensa political campaigns are just about politics. Candidates tell you what offices they have held in Mensa, what details of Mensa activities they feel are important, and what they feel their opponents have done wrong in regard to those details; all of which are fine (and probably sufficient in a campaign for local group office), but rarely do we see any discussion in national campaigns of what experience the candidate has in running a multi-million dollar corporation. Make no mistake—American Mensa is a business, not a social club. We have employees, whose financial security

depends on the decisions made by the national officers; we have millions of dollars in investments, which must be carefully safeguarded for the benefit of future members, and we make decisions about significant events and purchases that can be highly important to vendors and contractors. Yet the comments made by some of the candidates for national office make it obvious that they can't even read a financial statement.

I'm certainly not saying that it takes a CPA or an MBA to serve on the American Mensa Committee. Many good people have held national office and done outstanding jobs without even a college degree. But all other things being equal, some kind of business background will give a national officer a significant advantage over someone who has spent their career as, say, a poet, no matter how sincere and well-intentioned the poet might be. So if you see a letter or email from someone you've never heard of, wanting your vote for a national Mensa office, I hope you'll give some thought to what kind of corporate director that candidate would make, not just to what ax he or she has to grind.

By the way, for the benefit of all those who aren't multi-year or life members, this might be a good time to mention that if you haven't paid your Mensa dues for 2011 yet, your membership expires on March 31. If you want to vote, and I hope that you do, please renew right away!

Now, let's forget about politics and get back to the fun stuff. Don't forget Memorial Day weekend in Houston, where Gulf Coast Mensa will be pulling out all the stops to provide us with another terrific Regional Gathering. Hope to see you there!

DAN BURG FOR FIRST VICE-CHAIR

The job of First Vice-Chair is free-form. It is what the occupant makes of it. Various First Vice-Chairs have interpreted the same words differently over the years. "[A]ct as substitute during the Chairman's absence or inability to serve" - that's easy to discern. "In the case of vacancy in the office of Chairman . . . the [First Vice-Chair] shall move up" that's easy to discern too. But what does "assist in the discharge of the Chairman's duties" mean? To me, it means that the Chairman and the First Vice-Chair should act as a team. I provide informal advice and historical perspective and act as a resource to the Chairman and to other individuals and to the AMC as a whole. I'm also currently on eight national committees, including two as chair, and gather member input on issues important to them. I help people write motions whether I agree with the content or not; I do this because think it is

important that ideas get discussed without technical issues standing in the way.

Representing American Mensa internationally is another important part of the First Vice-Chair's job. The First Vice-Chair traditionally serves as one of American Mensa's national representatives to Mensa International. The international board meeting last fall was my ninth, the most of anyone currently in the American delegation. This experience has let me find solutions that are beneficial to both American Mensa and international Mensa.

I've chaired the national Bylaws Committee since 2005. During that time I've helped dozens of local groups update their bylaws. I've also informally reviewed bylaws and proposed amendments on request from several local groups, to help them get through the process faster. We've updated the Minimum Standard Bylaws to allow electronic distribution of ballots; now, local groups don't have to send printed copies of the newsletter to electronic-only subscribers just to get a ballot to them. The Minimum Standard Bylaws and the Model Bylaws contain a lot more explanatory material than they used to, and each is crossindexed. Each of those improvements was done under my leadership.

The First Vice-Chair has to be ready to step into the chairmanship at a moment's notice should the need arise. Well-rounded experience – local, regional, national, international – is important. I have that experience.

I would be honored to receive your vote to continue as First Vice-Chair. Thank you for your support.

COLUMBIA: SHADOW OF CHALLENGER

Challenger astronaut Ellison Onizuka answered the press question about what he hoped to accomplish by describing how he was looking forward to an opportunity to take a space walk during the shuttle flight. He had trained for such a contingency. He of course never got that chance.

The press conference was held two days before that ship exploded. Having the equipment on board to make an emergency space walk when the O-ring problem occurred was a precaution tragically ignored. But how well did NASA learn their lesson?

When foam struck the wing on Columbia's takeoff on January 16, 2003, there was no space walk equipment on board to go inspect the damage. Furthermore, the follow-up Report of the Columbia Accident Investigation Board indicates that most of the NASA officials on the ground argued the incident could not possibly have done any significant damage, even though their engineers had no data to support that assumption.

The Report indicates that the NASA engineers requested the use of spy satellite images of the shuttle to gather needed data for that assessment. Furthermore, the Report states that if those images had been used. probably have severe the the foam impact the top flight another critical

they would revealed how damage from was. However, managers made error by failing to

act on that request. This resulted in 7 astronauts losing their lives on reentry—very analogous to the previous flight managers' errors in judgment causing 7 astronauts to lose their lives 17 years before.

A day after the Columbia disaster I was interviewed by both a satellite radio station and a reporter from the Kyodo press (Japan). I stated that, as in the Challenger accident, the Columbia astronauts may have survived until they hit the ground, and described how an emergency space-walk could have gathered essential data on the extent of the damage from that foam collision, and even allowed them to repair it. I explained how they held the first discussion of providing the astronauts with safety capsules and parachutes after the Challenger accident, and speculated that if such equipment had been available on the Columbia, the astronauts might have survived.

The fact that preparation for emergencies and concern for safety were a low priority for the Columbia mission indicates that very little was learned from the Challenger disaster. A number of reports from engineers at NASA in the last few years have indicated that this has been afforded an inadequate priority for years. The Columbia failure was a disaster waiting to happen.

The manned space program is the most expensive item on the NASA budget, far exceeding the costs of unmanned missions, and safety should be the top priority for those expenditures. However 14 deaths in 25 years demonstrate that it has not been. That is the legacy of the shuttle program, which is close to the end of its days. NASA is now putting emphasis on the expensive space station program, which is not the most productive option. Several unmanned programs are doing much better--and not risking a single human life.

I first said in a 1989 newspaper editorial that NASA should devote at least as much money to the unmanned programs as to the manned program, since missions putting men and women into space are an order of magnitude more expensive because of the tremendous cost of supporting people there. There is pressure to cut corners on their safety because of these costs. I would now even suggest cancelling the manned program and dedicating the money to the other missions. Let the unmanned programs bloom.

I felt like my body had gotten totally out of shape, so I got my doctor's permission to join a fitness club and start exercising. I decided to take an aerobics class for seniors. I bent, twisted, gyrated, jumped up and down, and perspired for an hour...

The Jason Project is a subsidiary of the National Geographic Society. Its purpose is to motivate kids to learn science; they have their student curricula free for download on their Web site. What separates The Jason Project from other sites is the cool "Operation" format of the curricula. It makes kids feel like real scientists. The materials are geared to typical learners in 5th–8th grades. With topics such as geology, energy and ecology, these units (designed to last for weeks) have something for everyone. The Brain Bee:

If you have a budding neuroscientist, this is a cool deal. The Society for Neuroscience sponsors this competition in which students in grades 9-12 compete in local/national/international "Brain Bee" competitions. The materials to study are available free for download, so this can be done even as an ad hoc informal activity for a group or home school organization on an unofficial basis. If you have a local brain bee, obviously that's perfect, but you can get them started without too much fuss. There is lots of information on the site, so look around and see if you can find a bee near you.

There is an amazing amount of information on the site that is easy to read and interesting. For instance, several studies on taste are summarized. The studies are easily replicated by kids and would make a terrific science fair project.
