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# PEATURED MEMBER BIP





HI. I'm Joe DeBell.

I was born and raised in a small town in western New York, just south of Buffalo and Rochester--an area called the "Niagara Frontier." Rolling hills, dairy farms, cold, snowy winters, "lake effect" snow. A

Norman Rockwell kind of town, post-Great Depression. A broken family; my father deserted us when I was 4 and disappeared into New York City. My mother raised me until she died when I was 13 and she was only 33. I was fostered in relatives' homes until I graduated from high school in 1950.

I graduated pretty high up in my class; but with no family support or readily apparent way to get tuition for college, and the Korean War just breaking out, like many guys I enlisted. After basic training in the US Air Force in Texas and follow-on electronics training in Air Traffic Control in Mississippi, I was shipped to Korea as a mobile air traffic control technician. Though I was often at forward bases, I survived Korea, and returned to the US in late 1953, shortly after the Korean Armistice.

I stayed in the Air Force after Korea—I had found my "family;" and after a successful eight-year enlisted stint and several interesting assignments, I tested for and was accepted to Officer Training School. I graduated first in my class and was awarded a Regular Commission as a Second Lieutenant in the Air Force.

The next 22 years were filled with service in Vietnam, Iran (two years), Israel, Germany (four years), Iceland and several professional military training schools in the US. I was initially an instructor in various radar systems, then a Commander of several Air Force units of increasing size. Later I was a "staff officer" specializing in electronic warfare and intelligence systems, "spy" satellite systems, electronic cryptanalysis, and various "long-haul" communications systems. Along the way I earned a B.S. in Electrical Engineering and one in Business, and an M.B.A. from the University of Utah. I retired from the Air Force in 1980 at the Pentagon after 30 years, with the rank of Colonel.

After retirement, looking for something interesting to do, I got a real estate license and sold residential real estate for a short time. I didn't like it. So I went to school for commercial real estate development (land use, shopping centers). I found I really didn't care for that either; and

found myself drawn back to military stuff. I soon signed on with a large military defense contractor near Washington, DC doing familiar stuff again--military and government computer systems engineering. Extensive and exhaustive psychological testing prior to hiring on revealed that I was apparently Mensa material, so I joined Washington Area Mensa.

I worked in the company's Fort Monmouth New Jersey office on several military programs: electronic warfare, joint data systems and night vision development; eventually serving as their New Jersey manager for several years before moving back to their Washington DC headquarters. During this time I became more active in Washington Area Mensa. I also traveled a lot--to the Republic of China, Mexico, Bolivia, Venezuela, Hong Kong, Japan, Israel (again), Kuwait and Egypt--implementing various computer- driven systems. After almost 15 years of that I finally ended up as a Senior Department Manager for US Drug Interdiction Systems. During that time I also did post-graduate work at UVA's Darden School of Business in Charlottesville, Virginia.

After my youngest (of four) children was through college (UT at Austin), and with no more tuition to pay, I left the corporate world and started my own business in northern Virginia—as a corporate travel agent. (Since I had done so much traveling, I figured I knew something about it!). Some eight years and trials and tribulations later, I had four pretty successful businesses. Eventually I sold them all. In 2000, I retired (for the third and final time!) to an over-55 active adult community in Gainesville, Virginia, near Manassas. I went to golf school, became a Civil War buff, and did a six-year stint as the community's Resident Board Director.

When my UT Longhorn daughter married a Texas A&M Aggie (horrors!), and they moved to Houston and had two children, I got a tremendous amount of pressure from both her and my wife to move to Texas. Although I was pretty happy in Virginia I finally gave in, and my wife and I moved to Sun City, Georgetown in October of 2006. Now I really like it and Texas.

My personal life includes an early marriage in 1954, a divorce in 1968, and a later marriage in 1969 to my wife Joan, an OR nurse and former Air Force officer. I now have four married children, five grandchildren and two great-grandchildren. I play bridge, chess, tennis, golf; and most actively, table tennis (ranked USATT). I'm into genealogy (DNA analysis), biblical archaeology, and cryptology. I've been an active member of Mensa for over 30 years now.

A relatively recent activity of mine is the development of a Mensa SIG here in Sun City, where I moderate a group of some 14 resident Mensa members. We meet on a monthly basis in a social venue (usually my house) to discuss things in salon format that engage and interest us. Nothing is off the table--not politics or religion or sex. Our discussions include everything and anything: black holes, robotics, recent big bang discoveries, medieval cryptanalysis, religious historical origins, archeology, current political and social issues, eugenics, spirituality... you name it. Most recently, we've been discussing the "singularity", and when/how it will happen. We have no officers, no formal protocol-- only contributions to the

general group knowledge. It's a lot of fun, and its right here at home.

In retrospect, my not-so-great early life, broken home, and long military service caused me to learn to accept loss and deprivation and rely pretty much on myself for whatever I wanted to achieve; but also caused me to look at life less emotionally and more objectively. While I'm very social and make friends very easily, my emotional ties are not as strong as they might be. I think my family wishes they were stronger, that I was more emotional. Be that as it may, I do enjoy teaching my grandchildren things.

The regular monthly meeting of the Lone Star Mensa Board of Officers convened at 6 PM, June 1, 2011, at the home of Ron and Linda Edelstein. Attending were: Don Drumtra, Patty Drumtra, Ron Edelstein, Linda Edelstein, Crockett Grabbe, Jon Kurylowicz, John Neemidge, and Helen Siders. Referenced written reports and ASIEs are available on the LSM website. Paper copies are available on request. The board adopted without debate the agenda and the May minutes in the May 2011 Armadillo Literary Gazette (ALG), page 3.

The board received the following officer reports:

- LocSec: Member Concerns Action Plans Status Report no change ASIE, 2011-7 (Don)
- Treasurer: April 1–May 31 Financial Report adopted unanimously with discussion (Linda)
- Member at large: verbal status report on the glossary of acronyms used in Mensa (Crockett)
- Education Committee: verbal report that Lone Star area contestants won three scholarships in addition to our

"guaranteed" local winner. One was a national scholarship (the Harper Fowley, for a student getting a liberal arts degree), and two other regional scholarships. The winning essays will appear in the ALG (Patty for Claudia Harbert, Scholarship Chairman)

- Membership Committee: verbal report that three potential Mensa members were scheduled to take the test June 4. Mike Tolbert plans to proctor the test at the Regional Gathering. (Patty for John Pfeiffer, interim testing coordinator)
- Symposium Committee: verbal report that the regular membership meeting on June 8 will feature a discussion led by Rose Berkowitz on starting a formal LSM discussion group, and on July 13 will be a discussion led by Crockett Grabbe titled, "National Swindle at the World Trade Center;" both scheduled for 7-8:30 PM at the Northwest Village Branch Library (Don)
- LonestaRG Committee: verbal report that 13 registrations for the RG were added at the Houston RG. Speakers are lined up and a participatory music session is being considered. So bring your guitar or fiddle! (John)
- Website Working Group: verbal report that no further progress has been made. A committee meeting was canceled because of illness of

the hostess. (Don for Rose Berkowitz, Co-chairman)

The board members took the following action on motions postponed from the May meeting:

- Agreed in principle with the set of criteria listed in the latest
   Member Concerns Action Plans
   Status Report for satisfactory responses to member concerns, recommendations, and board plans (Don)
- Continued discussing terminology to replace ASIEs (Don)
- Continued discussing a motion to establish goals for the 2011-2012 term in line with National Mensa's goals, plus a goal of completing a percentage to be determined by the Board of the Member Concerns Action Report issues (Don).

Who Cut Your Budget?

According to a magazine article I read recently, the citizens of Federal Way, WA, were promised a light rail extension to their town by 2023 and agreed to an increase in sales tax to help make it happen. The King County agency reported that there was now not enough money to do it. The Mayor of Federal Way pointed out that the lower-income population of Federal Way needed an efficient way to get to Seattle where the jobs are, stating "It's our responsibility as leaders to find a way to deliver transit to the working class." A county council member's response was "It's not a matter of a promise being broken. It's a simple matter of addition and subtraction. You are a victim of the recession."

Do you think the council member provided a valid answer? It is true that King County has been hard hit by the recession. To balance their budget, council members have had to make deep cuts, lower salaries, and lay off many county government employees. (See <a href="http://www.kingcounty.gov/council/budget.aspx">http://www.kingcounty.gov/council/budget.aspx</a>.) One of those cuts was the extension of transportation to Federal Way. But is that the same thing as saying the mayor was a victim of the recession? Or would it perhaps have been more accurate to say that the extension was the victim of a decision of council members?

It seems to me that our elected representatives are all too quick to blame decisions they make on external factors. In the case of King County it seems clear to me that council members did a very credible job of living within the budget. So why not tell the taxpayers that the recession reduced our revenue, which caused us to reassess all our needs and make hard decisions? Wouldn't you like to hear our representatives say something like "We prioritized all the needs of this county to the best of our ability. This is what we can do without raising taxes. But here are three levels of things we can do if we raise taxes. Please let us know within the next two weeks what you think. We will still make the decisions, but your input will be considered." It is probably not that simple, but wouldn't it be nice if our representatives listened to all their constituents (not just their party) and had a real-time idea of what the folks they represent actually wanted them to do?



In May work was begun on one more action plan, bringing the number of plans being worked on to 19 of 44, or 44 percent.

Action plan highlights include:

- Crockett Grabbe provided a first draft of the glossary of terms for new members, plan A5.
- Members added more topics to the monthly meeting list of presenters and topics.
- The board approved the volunteer service name badge award for exceptional service for one or more terms of office, plan C4.

The board continued to work on criteria for adequate action to resolve or complete work on a member concern. In applying test criteria the board considered the opinion editorial insufficient to resolve plans A4 and

D6, dealing with the perception that LSM is being run by a clique.

She will be starting college at the University of Iowa, which offers an excellent and famous writing program. We are proud and happy to publish Ariel's winning essay and hope she will treasure her essay's appearance in the Armadillo Literary Gazette as one of her first publications! Here is Ariel's winning essay:



I have known I wanted to be a writer since I have known how to read.

Some kids play with imaginary friends, and in a way so did I - but my friends were witches and mad scientists and knights who went on wild escapades, galloping off into the horizon of adventure. I soon realized that these characters had to be set down on paper, recorded in stories of their own. So I began writing, and kept writing ever since. Distribution of my work by a notable publishing house is my lifelong dream.

I took my first steps toward that goal back in middle school, when I enrolled in a Literary Magazine class to learn about submitting, editing, and publishing my work. In high school, I took honors courses that emphasized composition skills, and further honed those skills with classes like Creative Writing. The former gave me practice at writing on deadlines and to specific standards, while the latter encouraged me to develop a personal writing style and get used to multiple revisions before a perfect final draft. Some abilities, like correctly following language rules, were easy to acquire; others, like taking criticism with an open mind and constructively applying it, needed time to get better.

But I didn't abandon my purpose outside the schoolhouse doors - a passion for writing suffuses my free time as well. Writing is more than a requirement for graduation to me; it's a love that will last my entire life. Even when I'm not writing myself, I read books related to the subject, from Stephen King's On Writing to Anne Lamott's Bird by Bird. By absorbing the advice of published authors, I hope to pick up tips on how to get my name on the same shelves as Jonathan Safran Foer and Chuck Palahniuk. I also like stretching my creative muscles with exercises like 15MinFic, where the goal is to write a short fiction based on a single word in the space of 15 minutes, or 55-word stories, which must be both precise and poignant. My greatest creative exercise to date is a yearly event called National Novel Writing Month, or NaNoWriMo. NaNoWriMo encourages budding writers like myself to put down 50,000 words of a novel in the space of 30 days. As of 2011, I have participated in NaNoWriMo 4 years running and completed the word goal once, a record I plan to improve next November.

Possibilities are endless for someone with my dream, and my horizons only continue to expand with time. Soon, I'll be attending one of my 6 chosen colleges with renowned writing programs to earn an English degree. I'll continue submitting to literary magazines and competitions, like the VFW's Voice of Democracy essay contest and this contest. Every goal I complete brings my stories one step closer to seeing the light of day. If hundreds of thousands can do it each year...if thousands do it each month...if hundreds do it every single day...I know that I, too, can publish my work, whether it be a novel, short story, or newspaper article. The road to success is long, but I've got an early start, and I won't stop until I realize my dream.


