At the March AMC meeting, the AMC passed a motion regarding members who have not specified electronic vs. print for their Local Group communications/ newsletters. Those who make no selection by September 1 will be considered "undecided" and will be distributed to the groups with the list of individuals who request to receive electronic communications.

To receive electronic newsletters, members must update their personal profile on the AML web site:

- 1. Select electronic distribution or not have made a selection on or after Sept. 1,
- 2. Have an email address on file with the National Office, and
- 3. Release email address within the organization.

If a member does not meet these criteria OR if a member selects print distribution, a label designating print distribution will generate for that member...The following flags will apply on reports and labels:

Code	Flag	Description
1	Ε	Receives electronic
2	Ρ	Receives print
3	P-EO	Receives print, selected electronic, without or withheld email address
4	E-N	Receives electronic, no selection made
5	P-N	Receives print, no selection made, without or withheld email

The E-N indicates those who have not selected but have an email address on file and release their email address within the organization. The P-N indicates those who have not selected and do not have an email address on file with us, or who do not release their email address within the organization.

[Members can check the mailing label code to be sure your selection has been recognized by the national office computer (or if you have not selected). Note that if you do not make a selection, you might be receiving your newsletter electronically from October on.—Editor]

The board adopted the agenda as amended and the June 1 minutes, printed in the July 2011 Armadillo Literary Gazette (ALG), page 4, without debate.

The board received the following verbal officer reports: - LocSec: Appointed Brian Bloch as Southern LSM Coordinator, and Jon Kurylowicz as Assistant Circulation Coordinator; the board confirmed the appointments; received no Member Concerns Action Plans Status changes; reported from the Annual Gathering that the fixed Local Group allotment may change to a variable one based on local group activities and that the Mensa Finance Committee may develop a common set of accounts for optional use of local group treasurers; (Don).

- Senior Officer: Discussed the glossary of acronyms used in Mensa (Crockett)

- Education Committee: Essays of three of our four scholarship winners will be printed in the ALG, (Claudia).

- Membership Committee: Three potential Mensa members took the test June 4 and two are registered for July 16 (Patty for John Pfeiffer, Interim Testing Coordinator)

- Symposium Committee: Future regular monthly membership meetings are on schedule (Don).

- LonestaRG Committee: There are 49 registrations (Linda for John and Geri Neemidge, chairmen).

- Website Working Group committee (Don for Patsy Graham, Chairman):

- The board accepted Rose Berkowitz's resignation from the committee without debate.

- The board adopted Ron's amendment to a motion to confirm Kathy Blair Lawler's appointment to the committee. The board then adopted with debate the amended motion to delegate authority to the Committee Chairman to make committee appointments and accept resignations from the committee.

The board members took the following action on items postponed from the June 1 meeting (Don):

- Agreed that the standard award name tag type letters will be navy blue on a white background.

WINNING REGIONAL SCHOLARSHIP ESSAYS

This year for the first time the Austin area had two scholarship winners at the regional level, meaning that these essays scored higher than most of the essays from AR, OK, TX, and NM! Here are the wonderful winning essays:

2011 Regional Scholarship Winner Grosswirth-Salny Scholarship Kathryn Bowman Kathryn Bowman is beginning her second year at the University of Texas Southwestern Medical School.

I am becoming a doctor and a medical researcher in order to improve human lives by integrating the care of my future patients with scientific study that can lead to improved therapies for infectious diseases. In pursuit of this goal, I engaged in years of undergraduate research at the College of William and Mary, followed by a full-time research fellowship at the National Institutes of Health, before entering medical school in 2009. I am currently a second-year medical student at the University of Texas Southwestern Medical School.

My interest in medicine and science was refined by my experiences in international travel, research, and interactions with a variety of healthcare systems. My interest in medicine stemmed from small veterinary tasks caring for horse injuries as a young equestrian. However, I realized my calling was in human care during a high-school trip to Haiti, when we stayed at the hospital compound Zanmi Lasante, founded by Dr. Paul Farmer. After that, I became enthralled with the idea of working on infectious disease. This field offers ample opportunity to translate pathophysiological understanding into therapeutics which can save lives both in the United States and elsewhere the mortality of infectious disease is much greater [sic]. My interest in global medicine drew me on a medical aid trip with fellow students to run a free clinic in rural Ghana. During college, I spent 2 years in a neuroscience laboratory doing immunological mapping of circuits in the brain controlling temperature homeostasis. After graduating Phi Beta Kappa and Summa Cum Laude from the College of William and Mary, I entered a year-long research fellowship, the NIH Academy, at the National Institutes of Health, working in the Vaccine Research Center on a HIV vaccine trial to help boost the immune system of individuals already infected with HIV. The experience inspired me and I returned to the same lab the summer after my first year in medical school. I will be second author on a paper to be published within the next 6 months detailing the results of our study.

As a second-year student at UT Southwestern, I am truly grateful for the opportunity to delve deeply into my medical training. I am the Development Chairperson for the Seldin Society of Internal Medicine, which hosts speakers to introduce medical students to various specialties in internal medicine. From running a station at our health fair to presenting my research at conferences, I am continually exploring various aspects of medicine that will further elucidate my path. I intend to graduate with an MD with Distinction in Research in 2013, after which I will pursue an Internal Medicine Residency and Infectious Disease fellowship.

My long-term career goals involve clinical practice in infectious disease, likely at a major academic center, which will allow me to translate what I learn from my patients into research questions in the laboratory. I recognize that this balance is a delicate one; the time it takes to properly care for my patients will challenge the time I have to explore the scientific side of their illness. However, I believe that this balance is critical to the future of medicine in order to develop effective therapies that offer cures rather than simple palliation of symptoms.

2011 Regional Scholarship Winner Kuhnel Scholarship Alicia Morgan Lyles Alicia will be studying for a Master's of Science in Urban Planning at Columbia University in New York City.

With the Mensa Scholarship, I aim to pursue a master's degree in urban planning. I am confident my past accomplishments in Houston and European cities demonstrate that I will be successful in the field. The valuable experiences in various urban centers lead me to conclude that dynamic planners can revitalize communities. Planning acts as a mirror that can be used to raise questions and prompt reevaluations of quality of life within enclaves. I aspire to be part of a profession that creates communities that offer better choices for how people live. My past accolades serve to reassure the scholarship committee that the funding will support the academic and professional goals of a future successful planner.

My senior year at Rice University I had 2 profound encounters that solidified my interest to attend graduate school and become a certified planner. First, I spearheaded an honors thesis project that assisted Houston's historic Second Ward neighborhood in responding to the potential pitfalls of gentrification. New development plans created tension among the long-time residents and the real estate developers eager to bring new energy to a neighborhood on the periphery of the city's vibrant downtown. My year-long assessment was instrumental to

aiding El Centro de Corazón, a Second Ward nonprofit organization, in arranging town hall meetings and participatory planning sessions for residents to express their opinions on the growth occurring in the area. As a result, residents and developers were more able to agree upon changes that better suited both parties' interests.

The Second Ward endeavor motivated me to take on an additional urban planning project that was on a larger scale and collaborative in nature. I assisted Dr. Michael O. Emerson, Co-Director of Rice University's Institute for Urban Research, in overseeing a critical project that assessed the amenities Houston's Hermann Park offers to 6 million residents a year. The team I led surveyed 500 visitors' opinions of Hermann Park, the Houston Zoo, Miller Outdoor Theater and the Hermann Park Railroad. Currently, the Hermann Park Conservancy cites the findings when writing local, state and federal grant proposals. I found it rewarding to be part of an interdisciplinary research project that enhances the quality of resources available to individuals residing in the fourth largest city in the country.

Finally, because my both projects [sic] were academically sound and yielded positive results, a committee of Rice University scholars awarded me a \$15,000 grant to study planning within an international context. I was one of 10 students across campus awarded the grant every year. I traveled to 9 major European cities interviewing inhabitants about their perceptions of local growth and methods for advocating change. After visiting many countries and meeting people of diverse backgrounds, it is clear that there is a need for planners to approach challenges as opportunities to assist communities in preparing for growth in a progressively urbanizing world.

My previous achievements demonstrate that I have the nascent qualities of a capable planner who is personally and professionally invested in pursuing a career in planning. After I graduate with my master's, I hope to work at a firm that specializes in a collective practice among urban planners, landscape architects and architects. This opportunity will facilitate a broad perspective when approaching real-world planning projects. Undoubtedly, the Mensa Education and Research Foundation Scholarship would support my endeavors and help me become an influential planner.

GHOST STORY

It was the 4th of July weekend, 1991. Howard and I had been married about a week earlier. I joined Mensa in 1987, and got Howard to take the test and join in early 1988, during Central New Jersey Mensa's Snowball RG, which I chaired that year at the Hyatt Regency in Princeton.

We decided to spend our honeymoon at Mensa's Annual Gathering, which was being held at the Hyatt Regency Crown Center in Kansas City MO. The AG typically draws about 2,000 people from all over the U.S., and even some international members. This year was no exception. There was the usual wide assortment of interesting speakers and activities, and the alwayspopular hospitality suites—kept stocked with a nice variety of beverages and munchies by volunteers. Conversations flowed, games were played, music was made, and strangers became friends. Howard and I had a great time participating in the Mensa Home Companion skit written by Dan Gilmore.

On Friday morning we decided to check out the hotel's swimming and sauna facilities. There was a separate elevator that took us and a few other Mensans, including

our friend Peggy Scherbina, to the pool area. As we were getting off the elevator, suddenly there was a man's *voice screaming "Help me! Help me!" Everyone on the* elevator heard it, and we immediately started looking for the source of the scream, to try to help. We searched up and down the corridors off the elevator and in the pool area and locker rooms, and found no one. Still concerned, we pushed the intercom on the elevator and contacted hotel security. They searched, but also found nothing. It was a complete mystery. Later that day we were talking to some people in the hospitality suite, and found out that ten years earlier, in July 1981, the hotel had been the site of a tragedy. Where there was now a separate elevator, prior to the accident there'd been three walkways instead, going from one side of the lobby to the other, the middle one connecting to a nightclub where people had been dancing. That walkway had collapsed, some say due to faulty engineering, taking down the one below it as well. 111 people had been killed just where the elevator was now located.

I'm convinced that what we all heard that day were the screams of a ghost—someone who'd died there while waiting for help that didn't get there in time. I'll never forget the chill I felt when I heard that desperate, disembodied cry.

WHAT IS THIS LONESTAR RG (AND WHY SHOULD I CARE)?

You've likely been seeing ads for LonestaRG for a few months, unless you're new to the group or have missed the 'Dillo. I'm hoping to convince you that you should sign up now and join us Labor Day weekend.

So, just what IS LonestaRG? It's our group's annual Regional Gathering (RG). RGs are conventions held by local Mensa groups. They combine speakers, workshops and activities, games, food, drink, usually a dance, and whatever else the hosts add to the event.

During this LonestaRG you'll have a full weekend of things to see and do. Listen to speakers, take part in workshops, play games, do puzzles, or just get to know fellow Mensans. Interact in a group, a few at a time, or one on one. Friday night we're having Minute to Win It and some other "get-to-know-you" activities, an outing to a Round Rock Express game, and likely a bat-watching outing to the Round Rock bat bridge. Saturday night is the Zombie Prom. Sunday night we're having a Name That Movie game and a sing-along jam session. Monday morning we'll have a speaker and some prizes.

We'll have speakers on Vampire Literature (one on classical, another on modern), Forensic Entomology, Fantastic Fest (and horror movies in general), and Haunted House Special Effects. Dinosaur George, a hit at least year's LonestaRG, will be our Monday morning speaker. Workshops include the Tarot, Flower Arranging, Self-Defense, Sugar Skull making, Thriller dance lessons, and zombie makeup. We'll have a blood drive on Sat.

RGs run on food and drink as well as activities. We generally have snacks, veggies, chocolate, and other munchies out all day and night. We plan five meals

(Friday dinner, Saturday and Sunday lunch and dinner). We'll have soda, water, beer, wine, and margaritas (with and without alcohol) out as well. All of that is included with your registration, as is the Chili Pepper Tasting.

Speaking of registration, rates are currently \$70 until August 19, \$80 until August 30 or at the door. We do offer day rates -- \$20 for Friday, \$40 for Saturday or Sunday, \$15 for Monday. Children 9-17 are half price; 8 and under are free.

We welcome children (ours will be at their 10th LonestaRG this year); most events are fine for children, and we have a kids' room where they can watch movies or play games together. We do not provide supervision but the room has a huge window and it is located in the same space as the other convention rooms--so the kids are nearby and easy to check on.

Bring your friends, too! We're having a Mensa admission test on Sat. morning for anyone interested in joining.

The RG will be held at the Wingate by Wyndham / Williamson Conference Center in Round Rock. We use the entire second floor of the Conference Center. It's a great location – one of the best we've ever seen for RGs – and easy to get to (located at IH-35 and US 79). Hotel rooms are \$85/night, and include a hot buffet breakfast.

This year's LonestaRG will be the Thirteenth. We (your co-chairs, John and Geri Neemidge), have been looking forward to this for quite a while— we love Halloween!

We really hope you'll join us for this – Lone Star Mensa's biggest event of the year!

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
