DON'S DIALECTICS—LEADERSHIP CRISIS

Have you heard? Lone Star Mensa is facing a *leadership crisis*. There have not been enough volunteers to serve on the 2012-2013 Board of Officers and no experienced volunteers who want to be our executive officers—LocSec, Vice-President / Secretary, or Treasurer.

How did this happen?



Our board consists of eight members elected to serve two-year overlappng terms. After their first year they become eligible, along with past elected officers (from anywhere in Mensa), to be the executive officers. The 2011-2012 term began with seven elected members—Crockett, Don, Helen, John, Jon, Linda, and Patty, with one vacant position, and Don, Patty, and Linda serving as our executive officers. Helen left the board last fall and Don, John, Linda, and Patty are completing their two-year terms at the end of March. This left the 2012-2013 board with Crockett, Jon, and six vacant board positions to be filled through our annual election process.

Last November our Nomination Committee called for volunteers to fill the six vacant positions on the board. Out of our over 600 members, no one was willing to serve. During the Christmas party, John, Aaron, and Douglas petitioned to be on the board and were subsequently elected.

Then, early in 2012, Jon advised the board that he would not be able to serve after the end of March. Only Crockett and John were eligible to be executive officers, and both had commitments that prevented them from serving as executive

officers. The net result was a 2012-2013 board with four elected members—Aaron, Crockett, Douglas, and John—four unfilled positions, and no one to be LocSec, V-P, or Treasurer.

So what happened to all our old Board Members?

Two years ago some members expressed concern that LSM was being run by a clique of old members who had held the elected leadership positions for years. These members said we needed new blood in our leadership—folks with new ideas. The board and other officers agreed, so we nominated and elected new members to the board—Jon and Crockett last year, and Aaron and Douglas.

What do we need to do?

We need at least four of you—from our over 600 LSM members—to volunteer to fill the four vacancies on the board. At least three need to be past elected officers (from anywhere in Mensa) willing to serve as the three LSM Executive Officers.

When we have volunteers, we will use the special election process in the bylaws to elect them to office. I can only hope that you care enough about LSM that you will take the initiative and send your name to Rose at editor@lsm.us.mensa.org.

MEMBER CONCERNS/ACTION PLANS STATUS REPORT

A flurry of activity since my last status report completed work on several action items and began work on others. By March 8, work had begun on 41 of the 47 action plans, or 87 percent. Of these, 37 or almost two-thirds of the action plans are reported as completed. More than half of these still need board approval but the super progress is the important thing. The goal the board set was completion and approval of half of the action plans by the end of the term (April 5). Depending on board approvals, it looks like our goal will be met. Highlights include:

Newsletter

Rose's reformatting the design and content on the newsletter will be complete with this issue. Of course change is inevitable and necessary as the desires of the members and content change. In the March issue Rose asked us all to tell her how she is doing. The results so far are very complimentary as you can tell from some of the letters Rose has included in this issue. Website

Douglas has volunteered to be our Webmaster and functional positions have been identified to provide the content so he can keep the site current. There has been a delay in the design effort while we search for a webdesign volunteer to help out. So although there is still much work to be done, the site has been kept relatively up to date and minor changes to the design are being made to improve usability. Last year, members expressed concern that the organization has been run by a clique that is reluctant to make changes. As may be seen in the Dialectics, appointment of new blood on the Nomination Committee, new board members, new members in other officer's positions, and new members on the RG committee, should dispel any concern that we have a clique now. The problem now is finding volunteers for the board and other vacant officer positions.

New Members

With the appointment of Patsy as New Member Coordinator, we now have someone who will provide care and feeding of new members. You will be seeing socials for new members on a more regular basis than before. These are not just for new members; current members should come and welcome the new members and help them understand what a great organization we have.

Monthly Meetings

Our new format of alternating between discussions and presentations has become more stable as we settle into our new location in the Carver Library. Most importantly, the board changed the rules so that we can tap into the wealth of speakers we have within LSM who want to share their knowledge and experiences with others. Lisa Oliver is an example. If you missed her presentation on Death Care, you missed insight into how most families get trapped into high cost services that they might need or want.

A current topic of discussi on among the member s of the

American Mensa Committee is the question of how to fill a vacancy in the office of Regional Vice Chairman. For all other AMC members, the process is simple: If an office becomes vacant the other AMC members simply elect a replacement to serve until the next election. For the first four decades or so of American Mensa's existence, the same procedure was followed for RVCs, but a few years back our legal counsel advised us that this is not allowed by the corporate laws of New York, which govern our operations.

In the following two national Mensa elections, proposals were put on the ballot to provide a new method of choosing a replacement RVC, either by holding a special election, or by allowing the Local Secretaries of the affected region to make the choice; but although both proposals received a majority of the votes cast, neither one was approved by the two-thirds vote necessary to pass an amendment to our by-laws. Other possibilities have been raised, but so far none appears likely to get the required two-thirds vote. The result is that if there should be a vacancy in the office of RVC, the remaining AMC members will elect a non-voting representative for that region, who will have all the privileges of an AMC member except the right to vote.

FROM THE RVC

Now there are two ways of looking at this situation: some of my colleagues on the AMC argue that simply having a voice at AMC meetings satisfies the most important requirements of regional representation, and it is true that in my three years on the AMC I have never seen a motion which passed or failed by one vote, so in practice perhaps just having someone present to speak up for the region's members is sufficient. On the other hand, there is a question of principle involved: if I pay the same dues in Oklahoma as a member across the state line in Kansas, but the Kansas member has a voting representative on the Board of Directors and I don't, doesn't that

devalue my membership in some way?

For now, there seems to be a strong preference on the current AMC in favor of the status quo, and in a way I find that understandable. After all, we've tried twice to get you, the members, to approve a new way of solving this problem, and both of our proposals have been rejected. Perhaps that indicates that you're all happy with the current system. Consequently, in the absence of a strong protest against the non-voting representative arrangement, I don't see any change happening. On the other hand, it may be that most of you aren't aware that I would effectively disenfranchise you by resigning my office, or by moving out of the region, which would have the same effect. Do you care?

You have elected me to represent you, and it is my intent to do so to the best of my ability, but I have to know what's important to you and what isn't. If this is something you think we need to pursue further, please contact me at

APRIL FOOL'S!

Amanda Lacy and Dave Miller met last fall at a Mensa meeting. Amanda was born totally blind. but thanks to an innovative free program called "the vOICe" (available at <u>www.seeingwithsound.com</u>), Amanda is now able to convert small black-and-white images taken with a digital camera into sound files, and for the first time "see" the shape, outline and texture of objects.



The system is very crude, so Dave began to work with Amanda, looking at ways to improve the program. Initially Amanda had limited skills when it came to visualizing 3-D shapes. Then Dave built

her a box illuminated with Christmas lights along the edges. The box and the numerous outdoor Christmas light displays they visited at Christmas allowed Amanda to make rapid progress in understanding the "sound" of particular three-dimensional spaces and objects. Soon Dave realized that Amanda's acute sense of hearing, combined with the vOICe system, opened up the possibility that she might be able to "see" enough to drive a car.

They began to experiment. Because Dave's car has a manual transmission, the first step was teaching

Amanda how to use the clutch and gearshift while guiding the car (very, very slowly) using the traditional "tap tap tap" of the white cane. She proved to be a natural at



coordinating the clutch and the transmission, but the cane system didn't work very well at all for the "where to aim the car" part



Of course Amanda doesn't have a learner's permit, so much to Amanda's annoyance Dave insisted that they move the next step to the Texas School for the Blind parking lot, where they began to

For example, she simply had to hit the brake and stop when an Austin Transit bus came up next to her and made too much noise for her to hear the tapping of the cane.



practice with a camera on the dashboard and the vOICe interface.

When the car is actually moving, Dave is in the passenger's seat. There are still huge problems— Amanda can see high contrast scenes best so, nighttime driving is a problem and we have not yet come up with a solution that allows Amanda to use mirrors. And a latenight I 35 experiment almost turned into a disaster. Traffic around Austin is getting much, much worse. So far the State of Texas is unwilling to make reasonable accommodations and issue a learners permit to totally a blind beginner, but the recent proposal to allow Google's unmanned vehicles to be tested on Texas roads opens up the possibility that Amanda might qualify under an unmanned vehicle provision—a good start, but clearly not the sort of accommodation that the Americans With Disabilities Act will eventually require as vOICe-like programs improve. We'll keep you posted.
