FROM THE RVC

At the recent meeting of the American Mensa Committee, the AMC discussed several possible scenarios for adjusting annual dues. One of the proposals heard was to set up a predetermined schedule for increasing dues by either a set amount or a set percentage every two years, the thought being that this would make it easier for members to plan ahead, rather than being surprised by unexpected dues increases from time to time. Several AMC members, myself included, thought that this idea would be extremely unpopular, not to say irresponsible, and were challenged to come up with alternative proposals.

I have some thoughts on this subject, which I will refine over the coming weeks and bring before the Finance and Audit Committee before we take up this discussion again at the Annual Gathering, but in the meantime, I would like to enlist the help of some of you.

The budget we just adopted for the 2012-13 year forecasts a small excess of operating costs over revenues, which is not a problem but does require some kind of action to bring the budget back into balance for the following year. Obviously, there are two ways to do this: either spend less or charge more. Anyone who has been following the national political debate over the last year or so is aware that less spending is a popular mantra these days, but the devil is in the details.

My challenge to you, therefore, is this: if you would prefer to leave the dues rate where it is (or maybe even lower it) and balance Mensa's budget by spending less, tell me exactly what areas you would like to see cut. Would you want your local group to receive less money each month if that would allow us to cut dues? Would you like to see the Mensa Bulletin cut back to a quarterly publication, or converted to electronic distribution? The new budget is still receiving some last-minute tweaks, so it is not yet published, but last year's budget is posted on the national website for your easy reference. If, on the other hand, it turns out to be necessary to increase dues, what would be the best way to do that? Should we apply an increase for inflation each year? Raise dues to match expenses every two years? Hold the line for as long as we can and then catch up all at once every five years or so? What's your preference?

Put those high IQs to work and come up with some creative solutions to this dilemma, then send them to me at RVC6@us.mensa.org, or by snail mail at 9920 Ridgehaven Drive, Dallas, TX 75238. I welcome your input.

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LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

Our RVC, Roger Durham, writes in his April column about filling vacancies when RVCs do not or cannot complete their term. However, he misleads when he says "we've tried twice to get you, the members, to approve a new way of solving this problem and both of our proposals have been rejected." We, in this case, would be the AMC, but half the truth has been left out. The facts are that the AMC first proposed the 'LocSec Option', whereby only the LocSecs in a region would appoint a successor to fill a vacancy. This, in a nationwide Mensa vote, received a small majority but not nearly the required twothirds needed to pass.

Then the AMC tried a second time, with a concerted effort crafted by Past Chairman Dave Remine and AMC Executive Member Dan Burg, in favor of the 'LocSec Option'. This motion was opposed by a 'Member Option' -- where all the members in the region vote for a successor -- proposal written by Jared Levine, a non-AMC member. The two options were put before all U.S. Mensa members, and the Member Option got more votes, just 38 shy of the required two-thirds.

So, "rejected" is indeed what the AMC's LocSec Option was, but the democratic preference was and still is being ignored. Roger also says that "there seems to be a strong preference on the current AMC in favor of the status quo". (If an RVC doesn't complete his/her term, the remaining AMC members will elect a non-voting representative for that region." Roger's perception is contrary to the facts.

Everybody who receives InterLink will have seen a piece written in January by Robin Crawford, another former AMC member, strongly touting the twice unsuccessful (rejected!) LocSec option. In support, she writes "Formal regional elections could take up to five months and cost up to \$11,000." However, when the LocSec option was first proposed, the AMC argument was that member voting in a regional election (the Member Option) could cost \$5,000, because of print and mail costs.

That number is now supposed to have more than doubled, even though American Mensa has adopted Electronic Voting. Challenged to substantiate \$11,000, Ms Crawford hasn't responded. Draw your own conclusions. As for "up to five months," that's probably as accurate as the \$11,000 figure.

It seems that that the AMC just won't give up and won't get behind the motion preferred by the members. Is this because the egos of AMC members are too large to permit a non-AMC motion to be preferred over an AMC-sponsored one? Will the thinking change when all the members of the AMC involved in the failed LocSec Option finally give up their positions of power? Who knows? What is clear is that we in Region 6 must press our RVC to do the right thing, to promote the Member Option as the solution to RVC vacancies.

LSM April Meeting

The April General Meeting included two programs in one. Our presenter, JimAnn Oliver, has an extensive background in education from special education teacher to researcher for the U. S. Department of Education. Some may remember her wonderful presentation last fall where she provided an overview of education and a summary of recent research findings that showed that the No Child Left Behind Program was doomed to failure from the very beginning. At the meeting several questions from the audience suggested that we all might not have a common understanding of intelligence and IQ tests. And after the meeting, several members asked for more detail on those results of her research. So JimAnn agreed to a return presentation to cover those two subjects in more detail. She returned for our April General Meeting.

IQ and Intelligence

—What is IQ? As one might expect everyone had different opinions on what IQ was. Using an easily accessible source--Wikipedia--JimAnn explained that we, like the general population, equate IQ with intelligence. In fact IQ is just a score, from a standard test that may represent a very specific type of intelligence. Test result from specific age groups are statistically constructed so that the mean score is 100 and the standard deviation is 15. That produces a bell shaped curve that most of us have seen where 95 percent of the test taker scores in each age group are between 70 and 130. Two and a half percent are below 70 and two and a half percent are above 130 (including Mensa's). So to summarize, JimAnn quoted one of the original IQ designers, Alfred Binét, who noted in 1905 that "The scale, properly speaking, does not permit the measure of intelligence, because intellectual qualities are not superimposable. And therefore cannot be measured as lineal surfaces are measured." After explaining that the scores are not very useful, JimAnn went on to explain that even though there are no strong correlations, there are weak correlations between scores and societal factors that are important. The U.S. military for example ran some experiments to determine if IQ scores could be used to screen recruits. It found that recruits with an IQ score around 80 could not master soldiering well enough to justify the cost of training them. They also found that a score of 85 was a good cutoff to use.

In the mid-1990s the American Psychological Association assembled a task force to study the correlation of IQ scores with various societal factors. Its report stated that one-fourth of social status variance and one-sixth of income variance correlated with IQ scores. It concluded that psychometric intelligence appeared as only one of a great many factors that influence social outcomes and that IQ "research findings are often assessed not so much on their merits of their scientific standing as on their supposed political implications." Nevertheless, the task force concluded that IQ scores do have high predictive validity for individual differences in school achievement and for adult occupational status, and that individual differences in intelligence are substantially influenced by both genetics and environment.

Finally, acknowledging briefly the theoretical aspect of testing, JimAnn introduced the Cattell- Horn-Carroll theory of intelligence currently popular with test designers, that calls the most basic intelligence "g" and proposes that there are nine skills involved:

- 1. Fluid. The broad ability to reason, form concepts, and solve problems using unfamiliar information or novel procedures.
- 2. Crystallized. The breadth and depth of a person's acquired knowledge, the ability to communicate one's knowledge, and the ability to reason using previously learned experiences or procedures.
- 3. Quantitative Reasoning. The ability to comprehend quantitative concepts and relationships and to manipulate numerical symbols.
- 4. Reading and Writing. Basic reading and writing skills. (Verbal understanding and usage.)
- 5. Short-Term Memory.
- 6. Long-Term Memory.
- 7. Visual Processing.
- 8. Auditory Processing.
- 9. Processing Speed.

"Of course," JimAnn noted, "we all know that this is far from definitive of intelligence; but it does seem to work fairly well for test designing of the present kind. Each test-making company decides which of these to include in its test(s) and to what extent, so of course there is variation in how a certain individual will score from one company's test to another."

JimAnn concluded the presentation with, "Let me emphasize that variations of a few points are par for the course from one test-taking to the next and from one person to another at one time or another, so there is no significance in having a "score" five points higher than someone else's, or higher or lower than you had last year unless you're trying to get into Mensa!"

For this fiscal year we budgeted expected revenue of \$6,500 from National Office. We actually received \$6,334.43, a difference of \$165.57. The biggest difference is in Communications, and that is driven by our decrease in membership. Where we had 658 members at Mar 31, 2011, we have 629 this year, and we've been lagging in renewals all year. The other revenue shown in the Symposia program was the cash paid by the December holiday party attendees. Since we never seem to spend everything we budget (in the past year we spent \$2035 less than was budgeted) we end the fiscal year with \$5,986.10 in the checking account, after payment of the a/p to GuikPrint. There is more than enough in our two CD's to cover our restricted funds, liabilities, and appropriations.
