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MAY BOARD MINUTES

The May regular meeting of the Lone Star Mensa board of officers convened at 7:40 PM, Thursday, May 3, 2012 at Carver Public Library, Rooms 2-3, 1161 Angelina, Austin, TX. Attending were Angela Adams, Don Drumtra, Patty Drumtra, Linda Edelstein, Ron Edelstein, Crockett Grabbe, Aaron Legare, John Neemidge, Jack Speyer, and Douglas Yee. The board adopted the agenda and the minutes of the March regular board meeting as printed on page 7 of the April Armadillo Literary Gazette. The minutes, agenda, referenced written reports, and other documents related to the meeting are available on the LSM Website. Paper copies are available on request.

The board received the following officer reports and took the following actions:

- LocSec: John thanked Angela and Jack for their interest the board and emphasized the need for need for other LSM members to step forward to be serve on the board.
- Treasurer: The board unanimously approved the April Abbreviated Treasurer's Report. She transferred LSM financial responsibilities and records to the board and Don agreed to maintain the books on behalf of the board until a new treasurer can be elected.
- ComComm: The board thanked Ron for acting as editor for the newsletter while Rose Berkowitz was recovering from eye surgery. Aaron volunteered to assist Ron with a view toward backing up Rose Berkowitz in the future.
- MemComm: Patsy Graham is planning a New Members welcome party on Sunday, May 6, 2 PM to 5 PM at her house. Don reported that there is a draft motion for the AMC to provide more rebate to the local groups and to restrict the surplus that local groups may accumulate.
- LonestaRG 2012 Committee: John announced that the tentative theme for the 2012 RG would be "Food for Thought" and invited members to volunteer to be the RG chairman and committee members. He will be convening a meeting soon for interested volunteers.
- Website Working Group: Patsy and Douglas reported that a basic design has been accepted, which Douglas will implement in software for further review.
- Action Plan Status: Don reported that actions on 64 percent of action plans have been approved leaving 17 to be completed.

Unfinished Business:

- Acting as a committee of the whole, the board reviewed the vacancies and proposed volunteers to do the work on a temporary basis. The board adopted the assignments as shown on the officers and contacts Webpages, at http://www.lsm.us.mensa.org/officers/.
- The board adopted the outgoing Treasurer's proposed budget for standing committee expenses. The bookkeeper agreed to propose additional budget items at the next meeting.

As you read this, the year's first Regional Gathering in Region 6, Gulf Coast Mensa's SynRG in Houston, will probably be history, but there will be plenty of other upcoming opportunities for you to find out why Mensa Gatherings are so popular, if you've never attended one. Next up, of course, is the Big Kahuna of Gatherings, the Annual Gathering, Mensa's annual national convention. Held in Reno, NV this year,

from July 4th through July 8th, the AG will attract about 2,000 Mensans for four days and nights of games, workshops, speakers, dancing, partying, and general merriment. You can still be one of them. See your copy of the Mensa Bulletin for more information, or check the AG website

Another Regional Gathering comes up over Labor Day weekend in Round Rock, TX, where Lone Star Mensa will put on the 2012 version of LoneStaRG. A little shorter and smaller than the AG, but featuring many of the same opportunities to interact with your fellow Mensans. Details will be available soon.

Then, at Thanksgiving, you can attend North Texas Mensa's RG, <u>Feast of Pleasures and Delights</u> <u>XXXIII</u> in Dallas. One of the oldest and largest RGs in this part of the country, the Dallas RG moves to a new hotel this year, but will continue to provide the same North Texas hospitality and entertainment as before. More information will be coming along in the near future.

Last, but certainly not least, you can spend the first weekend in December with your fellow Ms in the party capital of our region (if not the nation), New Orleans. Yes, in 2012 New Orleans Mensa returns to the Gathering circuit for the first time since 2005, when they hosted the AG. (You may recall a little unpleasantness that followed shortly thereafter, but I'm sure the two events were not related.) Anyway, NOM is back in the RG business in a big way, with a downtown hotel on the St. Charles streetcar line just a few blocks from the French Quarter and the casino. Details are still under development, but watch for a listing in the Mensa Bulletin soon. Needless to say, I'll be mentioning this again soon as well.

And now for something completely different: a couple of months ago, I asked for your input regarding the filling of vacancies in the office of Regional Vice Chairman. As I expected, I heard from only four people, two of whom were completely satisfied with the current system. LSM May Meeting

Part 2 Research on Education

The April General Meeting included two programs in one. In the first part of the program JimAnn discussed IQ and intelligence –the ability to learn. In the second part she summarized factors that influence actual learning. These factors are based on her years of research. "These statements are a little of what we do know from years and years of intensive research and experience." They might seem obvious to those of us who have raised children but they evidently were not obvious to the developers of the No Child Left Behind program.

Factors Influencing Children and Learning

Factual knowledge about children and how they learn is the most important element needed to design an effective education program. JimAnn presented the five factors that research shows have the most influence on children's learning.

- 1. There is tremendous variation in abilities and background from child to child. JimAnn elaborated in her discussion on IQ.
- 2. All learning is achieved individually.
- 3. Children move in learning from what they know to the next step. Each child has his/her own learning pace, which varies from skill to skill. JimAnn pointed out that each child this very different in how they learn
- 4. Children respond to and engage best in activities for which the adult present shows enthusiasm, and in which the student is helped to feel good about himself and his response and engagement. She emphasized that motivation is critical to learning.
- 5. Children spend their most critical years in the home and neighborhood before ever coming to school, and continue to spend more time there than at school. The parents are the major influence on the educational success of the child. JimAnn emphasized that "The most important factor in education is what the parents "be!" This is the same foot stomping point she made in her in her presentation last fall.

Factors Influencing Teachers and Teaching

Factual knowledge about teachers and teaching is almost equally needed for program development. JimAnn presented eight factors from her research that relate to what the teachers job should be for children to learn effectively.

- 1. The job of the teacher is to present material to be learned in a format and atmosphere in which each child has the best opportunity for learning.
- 2. The best atmosphere for learning involves passion on the part of a parent, teacher, or other mentor which is conveyed to the person learning such that it catches his/her interest and engagement. JimAnn pointed out that street gangs have figured this out and use it well.
- 3. Teachers do the best job when they have some control over choosing their materials and methods.
- 4. The educational level of the teacher is not an important factor in how well students can do. Training workshops teachers attend, or getting higher degrees, have almost no impact on the learning level of the children.
- 5. Increasing teacher salaries substantially encourages the best-qualified persons to choose or remain in that profession.
- 6. Teachers, like all human beings, learn best and do best when given positive strokes, sympathy, and encouragement.
- 7. What the child already "IS" when he arrives at school, both for the first time and on a daily basis, is far more important than anything the teacher can do after he/she gets there.
- 8. Yes, teachers do make a difference, but very little compared to the home.

Factors Concerning Schools

JimAnn concluded her research section with three factors relating to schools that research shows are the most important influences in children learning.

- 1. Schools in neighborhoods which are run down and crime-ridden have two strikes against them.
- 2. The administrators of a school set the tone as either positive or negative toward teachers, children and the learning tasks. Positive is better.
- 3. A smaller number of students in the ratio of students to teacher does make a difference, particularly in the lower grades. In other words, the opportunity for personal interaction is important. Schools appear to recognize this in some of their sports programs (like in the ratio of coaches to football players).

Conclusions

So, JimAnn asked us, What can we conclude from our discussion of IQ and the factors influencing children's education? After some discussion, JimAnn gave us her take:

So what is my idea of a good education?

In an ideal setting, each child's home background would be understood by the school personnel, his level of understanding of the subject matter in each area of the curricula would be known and briefly re-assessed every few months, his own best ways of acquiring knowledge would be determined (Some of us learn better through vision, some through hearing, some through manipulating, and so on. Some can learn by precept, some by admonition, some by observation, and some only by experience. At times we do not learn certain things by any of these ways.), and his potential pace for that acquisition would be taken into account as all these factors are used to plan his materials, methods of instruction, and expectations. The child would then be moved along as quickly as possible from one level in each subject to the next, with checks every few days to make sure each step is understood before moving to the next. This all done by a person who loves him/her, is excited to be working with him/her, is interested in what is being taught and conveys that enthusiasm to the student.

More costly than the way it's being done now? Well, in the need for more classrooms (because student-teacher ratios would be lower in many instances) and more teachers of certain kinds as opposed to other kinds of which we have an overabundance at present. Also, teacher salaries would have to be raised a great deal in many instances, to be commensurate with the value of their jobs and to retain the really good teachers, many of whom are by definition capable of holding much more lucrative jobs with which to support themselves and their families.

However, on the financial plus side tons of money would be released by stopping the almost-worthless programs which are being paid for right now, and particularly all the employees of the bureaucracy administering and keeping accounts of all the reams of unneeded laws and guidelines and enforcements. Our meeting concluded with a raucous round of applause. If you were not able to attend, you missed a good meeting.

by the "Mensa test" in <u>Reader's Digest</u>. A year later, after attending our Annual Gathering (about 60 people), we emigrated to Houston. It took many frustrating phone calls to American Mensa's indifferent National Office staff, then in New York, to become members in the U.S.A.

We weren't active for some years, while we established ourselves. We went to an occasional dim sum breakfast and not much else. We became more active in the early 1990's and I went to my first Annual Gathering in Houston in 1996. More on AGs later...

Around that time, I joined the board of Gulf Coast Mensa and served two years as LocSec.

At the end of 1999, I went to live in California, went to a lot of Mensa events so as to meet people, and ended up on the board of Greater Los Angeles Area Mensa.

My biggest achievements for Los Angeles Mensa related to interaction with the "new" National Office (by then in Texas) and with various AMC members. Some examples: the folks in L.A. still considered American Mensa's hierarchy to be "those people on the East Coast", and there was no love lost. I helped craft some by-law changes and was told by the Los Angeles board that it could take six months to get a response and even then there would be revisions demanded. A quick email to Russ Bakke, the national by-laws Chair, and I got the amendments back, accepted "as is", in four days. Someone else complained that her membership renewal hadn't been processed and she couldn't "get this fixed." One phone call to Paige at the National office and the problem went away. My 'reward' was for me to be drummed into service as LocSec.

I moved back to Texas in 2008 and settled in San Marcos. My next Mensa appointment was as editor of InterLoc. This wonderful publication is now defunct. It served as the outlet for ordinary Mensa members to be heard on the national scene and was originally a separate publication. To save postage, it was incorporated into the Bulletin and I had a couple of great years editing and writing for all 55,000 or so U.S. Mensans. This ended when Mensa's Publications Officer decided to do away with InterLoc and instead put out a monthly email piece called InterLoc and instead put out a monthly email unequivocally supports any action of the AMC or the National Office.


Since then, I've kept a low profile, only opting to be an area coordinator for Lone Star Mensa.

Finally, more on AGs. Since 1996, I've missed only three Annual Gatherings, and I'm going again this year. The first couple of AGs were all about programs – the educational, the lighthearted, the understanding of Mensa business. After that, it became more and more about meeting people, then renewing these new friendships. I met people from all over the USA and other countries, men and women who became friends, close friends, even lifelong friends. This more than anything is why look AGs.



Strange Change

"Phony as a three dollar bill". Ever heard that remark? Ever wondered why we *don't* have three dollar bills? We do have two dollar bills, though they don't circulate much these days. Well, in times past... say, the 19th century, we *did* have three dollar bills. Also fifty-cent bills, twenty-five cent bills and all sorts of strange (to our modern eyes) coins. Let's take a look at a few.

First "Nickel"

Now when you speak of a nickel, you think of a five cent coin. But the first U.S. Coin made of nickel (actually, an alloy of nickel and copper) was a cent. Prior to 1857, the U.S. cent coin was a large copper piece, a little larger than a modern twenty-five cent coin. But copper prices were rising and the Treasury was tasked with finding something cheaper. (Sound familiar? It has happened several times in recent years and is a discussion going on in Washington right now.) The decision was made to reduce the cent size and use cheaper materials, and the result was a 19mm coin made of an allow of 88% copper and 12% nickel, a much cheaper metal at the time. Unfortunately the flying eagle design, though aesthetically pleasing, did not strike up well in the minting process, so after two years—1857-1858-- it was replaced by the well known "Indian head" design of the same specifications. In 1865, the Indian head was changed to an allow of 95% copper and the remainder of tin and zinc. The size has remained the same until the current cents in your pocket, though the composition has changed a number of times over the years. The current Lincoln cents, since 1982, are pure zinc plated thinly with copper.



In God We Trust

This motto, now found on all U.S. Coins, first appeared in 1864, during the Civil War, on the new bronze 2ϕ coin. The 2ϕ piece was issued from 1864 to 1873, when it was abandoned.



Three Cent Coins

In 1851 the postal rate dropped from 5ϕ to 3ϕ and coins were in short supply to make change when people wanted to buy stamps. So the 3ϕ coin was created for that purpose. (Simultaneously the \$3 gold coin was created to buy sheets of 100 3ϕ stamps.) The first 3ϕ coin was a tiny silver piece, immediately referred to as a "trime" (1/3 of a dime). At 14mm diameter, this is the smallest U.S. coin ever issued. It was too small for practicality, so in 1865 a 3ϕ copper-nickel, somewhat lager, was issued. Strangely enough, the silver trime continued to be minted until 1873, when it was abandoned. The larger copper-nickel version continued on until 1889.
