## FROM THE RVC

On October 30th, the American Mensa Committee, your national Board of Directors, met via teleconference to make the difficult decision to raise dues for 2013. It was a long and spirited meeting, but in the end the decision was made to increase Mensa dues to \$70 per year. I

was not in favor of such a large increase, but when it became clear that a smaller amount could not get a majority, I finally voted for the \$70 motion to forestall those who wanted to raise the dues even higher.

This dues increase had been on the AMC's agenda since last spring, but the exact amount of the change was not decided until the last minute. There were several factors driving this decision, one of them being simple inflation, but the largest and most urgent was the decision of Mensa International to increase by 50% the amount American Mensa Ltd. must contribute every year to be a part of the world-wide organization. That decision, made in October, virtually guaranteed a substantial dues increase for every national Mensa body, including AML. Without that, a much smaller increase would have been feasible. Actually, the



numbers seemed to indicate that the exact amount of increase required would have brought the annual dues to \$69, but for fairly obvious reasons we felt that such a number would have instigated too much sophomoric humor,

and \$68, while probably adequate for 2013, just wouldn't provide sufficient revenue in subsequent years. By going to \$70 now, it is my hope that we will be able to avoid another increase for 2015. In addition, the preliminary figures provided by the national staff

indicate that with the additional revenue provided by this dues increase, we should be able to increase funding for local groups next year, although that cannot be determined until the budget meeting in February or March. In the meantime, however, the AMC will meet again in conjunction with the New Orleans Regional Gathering the first weekend in December, and you may rest assured that I will be pressing for a commitment to include a local group funding increase in the budget for the upcoming year.

Speaking of the New Orleans RG, I hope that a goodly number of you have made plans to attend. This is the first Gathering of any kind held by New Orleans Mensa since 2005, and they are really anxious to show off their unique brand of hospitality. I have been accused of spending too much time pushing Gatherings, but there are several thousand of you out there who have never been to one, and I truly believe they are what Mensa does best. You're short-changing yourself if you don't try one. Even if you can't make it to New Orleans, I hope you won't pass up the chance to attend the Annual Gathering in Fort Worth next summer. That's the last time the AG will be in our Region for the rest of this decade, so make your reservation now!

Whatever you decide, please accept my best wishes for a joyful holiday season and a happy, healthy, and prosperous New Year.

## THE MOST IMPORTANT EDUCATION TECHNOLOGY IN 200 YEARS

Education is about to change dramatically, says Anant Agarwal, who heads edX, a \$60 million MIT-Harvard effort to stream a college education over the Web, free, with plans to teach a billion students, Technology Review reports.

"Massive open online courses," or MOOCs, offered by new education ventures like edX, Coursera, and Udacity, to name the most prominent (see "The Crisis in Higher Education") will affect markets so large that their value is difficult to quantify.

A quarter of the American population, 80 million people, is enrolled in K-12 education, college, or graduate school. Direct expenditures by government exceed \$800 billion. Add to that figure private education and corporate training.

At edX, Agarwal says, the same three-person team of a professor plus assistants that used to teach analog circuit design to 400 students at MIT now handles 10,000 online and could take a hundred times more.

Coursera, an alliance between Stanford and two dozen other schools, claims that it had 1.5 million students sign up.


### Changing the world

The rise of the MOOCs means we can begin thinking about how free, top-quality education could change the world.

Khan's videos are popular in India, and the MOOC purveyors have found that 60 percent of their sign-ups are self-starters from knowledge-hungry nations like Brazil and China. Nobody knows what a liberal application of high-octane educational propellant might do. Will it supersize innovation globally by knocking away barriers to good instruction? Will frightened governments censor teachers as they have the Web?

The eventual goal isn't to stream videos but to perfect education through the scientific use of data. Just imagine software that maps an individual's knowledge and offers a lesson plan unique to him or her.

**Preliminary Second Quarter Financial Report**

*Submitted by Don Drumtra, Treasurer*

Tables 1 and 2 constitute the second quarter financial report. Table 1, Program Active Analysis Summary, shows the revenue and expenses for the first and second quarter. Membership revenue was below expectations in the first quarter but has improved in the second quarter due to an increase in testing revenue. It is now 90 percent of expectations. Other revenue is meeting expectations. Expenses average half of what they should be, indicating that we have financial room for additional activities for our members.

Table 2, Balances Analysis Summary, shows our current assets and liabilities. The roughly \$4700 increases in both in the second quarter are the undistributed results of our RG. These funds will be distributed to revenue and expense accounts in October. Our Total Net Assets continue to increase at roughly \$800 per quarter. Our overall goal should be to break even, indicating again that we should be doing more with our money than putting it in the bank account.

This report has not been approved by the board and is therefore subject to minor changes. The approved report will be posted in the Website after it is approved. Questions about the report may be directed to the Treasurer.
