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MARCH BOARD MINUTES

The March regular meeting of the Lone Star Mensa board of officers convened at 7:25 PM, Thursday, March 7, 2013 at Carver Public Library, Rooms 2-3, 1161 Angelina, Austin, TX. Attending were **Don Drumtra, Patty Drumtra, John Neemidge, and Douglas Yee**. The board adopted the agenda and the minutes of the January and February regular board meetings as printed on page 4 of the January and page 3 of the February *Armadillo Literary Gazette respectively*. The *Gazette* is available on the LSM Website and paper copies are available on request.

The board received the following officer reports and took the following actions:

- LocSec: The LocSec announced Fred Goertz's appointment of Ravina to the Membership Committee as Current Member Coordinator. She will work with Patsy Graham, New Member Coordinator to help members keep their membership information and renewals up to date. We appreciate Ravina Nelson volunteering for this important work.
- **Treasurer**: The board adopted the Treasurer's report for the fiscal year through February. Revenue continues to meet estimates and expenses are significantly below estimates indicating that there are funds that continue to be available to support member activities.
- ComComm: The March newsletter went out late due to confusion in the implementation of the new USPS bar code system. A postal rate increase was implemented in January but will have only minor impact on our mailing costs. Due to some complaints, the board reviewed the newsletter editorial policy. Board members agreed that the policy in the Mensa Handbook was adequate, that newsletter content continues to meet those requirements, and that no further action was needed,
- EdComm. No report from either Scholarship or Gifted Youth programs.
- **MemComm**: Patsy Graham continues to send letters to all new members via email and snail mail if an email address is not available. No testing activity was reported. Ravina is learning her duties as current member coordinator.
- **SymCom**. Angela Adams is hard at work bringing new programs to our monthly meetings. See this and other newsletters for details.
- LoneStar RG XV Committee: The Committee had its first meeting on January 23. The facility contract has been signed. Participants discussed speakers, estimates of attendance, revenue and expenses, and other activities. All LSM members are invited to participate in planning for and working at the RG.
- **Website Working Group**: Douglas Yee reported that the working group continues to wait for feedback from the designer.
- Mind Games Committee. John reported that the preparations are on track.

A WORD TO THE WISE

This month I am contributing a short bio to the 'Dillo. (See below.) With that in mind, it seemed like a good time to answer the question: Why get involved in Mensa? I joined Mensa in 1983 while in high school in Houston, where I grew up. For me. Mensa appeared during that point in high school where you have many things to apply for; it was one more thing to apply for, that my test scores qualified me for. A while after joining, Gulf Coast Mensa held their annual regional gathering and I decided to attend; it was only a short drive from my parents' house. DOWN THE RABBIT HOLE


Is a mob not terrifying



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
