According to our official Mission Statement, the mission of American Mensa is to "identify and foster human intelligence for the benefit of humanity by encouraging research in the nature, characteristics and uses of intelligence and by providing a stimulating intellectual and social environment for its

members." Most of us are familiar with the "social environment" part of Mensa's activities, but what about the rest? Does your local group do anything that could really be termed "for the benefit of humanity"? Some do, of course. Many local groups have scholarship funds, and a few participate in fund-raising activities for various worthy causes, but do we do anything to encourage research? Are we really living up to the ideals expressed in our Mission Statement?

Well, yes, actually, we are. Most of our activities "for the benefit of humanity" are not carried on directly by American Mensa or its local groups, however, but by our 501(c) (3) affiliate, the Mensa Education and Research Foundation, or as they prefer to be called these days, the Mensa Foundation. The Foundation, on behalf of American Mensa, sponsors research, encourages scientific studies, and distributes many thousands of dollars in college scholarships each year. To help support this work, American Mensa contributes one dollar

per member to the Foundation each year out of your dues. But that's not nearly enough to fund everything the Foundation does. They are dependent upon donations from you, the members of Mensa, for the majority of their funding. You can support the Foundation by purchasing a brick for the "Walk of Minds" at the National Office, or by just making a gift, either individually or through your local group.

Memorial contributions to the Mensa Foundation are a great way to honor a member who made a significant impact on your local group or just on a few close friends. If your group gives scholarships, consider giving those scholarships through the Foundation. They will publicize and award a scholarship in the name of your group. You can either create an endowment by turning over your scholarship funds to the Foundation to be invested along with their other funds, or you can keep and invest the money at the local level and simply agree to send them sufficient funds each year for the next year's scholarship. The latter option was recently chosen by my own group's charitable affiliate, the NTM Scholarship Foundation, which is funding two \$1,000 scholarships each year.


Gault Site

It is both a brief discussion of the highly complex and contentious state of affairs in the fascinating field of North American archaeological research and an announcement and invitation for LSM members to visit the Gault site. ARCHAEOLOGY—GAULT SITE

Ales Hrdlicka, founder and first curator of physical anthropology at the U.S National Museum (now the Smithsonian) and considered one of his generation's leading authorities on American archaeology famously proclaimed that there is nothing truly ancient in the Americas.

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His views represented the conventional wisdom of the day. Then, in the 1920's, several landmark discoveries shattered the conventional wisdom and proved that man was indeed present in the Americas at the end of the Pleistocene, thousands of years earlier than anyone thought possible. A new generation of scientists set out to re-examine the fundamental questions of when and how we got here.

Over the course of the second half of the twentieth century a new conventional wisdom took root around the idea that immigrants from Asia crossed the Bering land bridge about 12,500 years ago and quickly colonized both American continents, contributing to the extinction of entire populations of Pleistocene megafauna in the process. These "first" immigrants, dubbed "Clovis" in reference to the distinctive stone projectile points they used (and the site in New Mexico where they were first identified), were characterized as highly specialized big-game hunters who moved continuously across the landscape, from one kill-site to the next, for just a few centuries, before giving way to more diverse hunter/gatherer cultures that followed. And with that, many scientists considered the case closed. But for others,

a number of nagging questions remained, not the least of which were the apparent lack of an identified antecedent for the Clovis culture, with its highly specialized lithic technology, and how to explain a growing number of anomalous sites that didn't fit the Clovis-first model.



in recent decades, the innovative application of a complex array of technologies to archeological research has significantly expanded our ability to analyze old evidence in new ways, giving rise to new interpretations. In addition, a arowing number of welldocumented older-than-Clovis sites, both here and in South America, have shaken the foundations of the old paradigm. It has become clear that the case is not closed at all and, in fact, it now appears there may be many chapters of this American story yet to be written.

So today, a revolution in archaeological thought is underway. Interestingly, one of the most compelling research efforts in this field is centered right here in Central Texas. The Gault site, in far western Bell County, has turned out to be not only one of the largest and richest Clovis campsites ever discovered, but much more. Set in a protected valley at the headwaters of the springfed Buttermilk creek, this site was apparently occupied more

or less continuously for the entire span of the Holocene. It offers evidence of how early man's subsistence strategies changed in response to wildly shifting climatic conditions over the course of the last 13,000 years.

And, while research is ongoing and final conclusions are yet to be published, there is tantalizing evidence for a human presence here as much as 2,000 years earlier than Clovis. The project is managed by the Gault School of Archaeological Research, a non-profit headquartered at Texas State University and under the direction of Dr. Mike Collins and Dr. Clark Wernecke. Unlike many archeological projects, the Gault effort is very open. Promoting public awareness is one of the GSAR's objectives and public tours are conducted regularly. Tour information and bookings may be arranged through the Bell County Museum, the Williamson County Museum or directly through the GSAR website.

Whether your interest is archaeology, anthropology, man's relationship to a changing environment, the dynamic processes of science in general, or all of the above, Gault will not disappoint you. Hope to see you there some time.
